We're at last beginning to feel the pinch of war. The various items now being rationed are straining home. It is quite possible that there will not be as much candy and sweets available because all that takes sugar.

But let's not grumble and complain about it. Remember, boys and girls elsewhere have been and still are suffering more than we have ever dreamed of. A priest was telling me the other day that he had heard from friends in Corsica and that they have had no will for better than three months. Over in South China a sister writes to say that "they are almost starved and they can almost see nothing in their rice bowls".

Father Pettit of India writes that he is helping to win the war by cutting his living expenses, but there is one luxury which he will not deny himself. "I've allowed myself the lone luxury of adopting a few orphans, a luxury I simply will not give up till the cupboard is not only bare but broken up and burned, as fuel for the food we haven't."

I sincerely trust, boys and girls, that your adoption of pagan habits will never be included as an act of self-denial. Please follow Father Pettit's advice. He concludes his letter by saying that he too is up for adoption, though he's "finally forced to the reluctant admission of a bald pate".
