Brisk Ticket Sale Opens For Msgr. Sheen Lecture

AUBURN—The announcement that Monsignor Fulton J. Sheen was coming to Auburn was acclaimed by Auburnians as one of the greatest events in the life of Auburn in recent years.

There is scarcely a person in Auburn of the Diocese of Rochester who has not listened to Monsignor Sheen's broadcasts over the National Hookup and they little thought that some day he would come to Auburn to lecture.

Monsignor Sheen was born in Illinois on May 8, 1893, and was ordained to the priesthood in 1916. The University of Louvain awarded him the Cardinal Mercier Prize for Philosophy in 1935 and he was the first American to receive that honor.

AUBURN—Sunday, May 13, was National Communion Sunday for the members of the Catholic Daughters of America. The members of Court Auburn received separate Communion in their respective churches.

The regular business meeting of Court Auburn will be held on Monday evening, May 11, at which time officers for 1943-1944 will be elected. National and state officers are insisting that in order to be eligible for election to an office in the Catholic Daughters, a member must have all indebtedness to the Court paid, and that all officers who have missed three meetings or more, without a good excuse, are not candidates for re-election.

Fr. White, Maryland Missioner in Korea, Is Reported Safe

GENEVA—Word was received here this week of the safety of Fr. F. White, M.S.M., Maryland Missioner in Korea, son of Mrs. Joseph E. White of 111 South Main Street. Anxious over the welfare of her son was relieved upon receipt of the news which came directly from the Maryland Mission headquarters.

The information was secured through the office of the Holy See, whose delegate in Tokyo, Archbishop Paul Marini, made direct inquiry of the Japanese government.

The Korean Maryknollers are described as interested but are understood to make no military proposals. Since the Japanese allowance of three yen per day for each is sufficient for daily needs, Maryknoll headquarters intends to augment the amount by remittance through the State Department.

Father White was ordained on June 14, 1937, at the Seminary of the Catholic Foreign Mission Society of America at Georgetown, D. C. He celebrated his first high mass at St. Stephen's Church in Geneva on Sunday, June 20th, 1937.

Before joining the Maryland Foreign Mission Society, Father White attended St. Stephen's parochial school, St. John the Evangelist in Rochester, St. Francis at Lake High School and Georgetown University, Washington, D. C., and the Maryland College at Clark Summit, Pa.

In July, 1937, Father White left this country for his assigned post in Korea, where he has since remained, laboring for conversion among a large non-Christian population. When last heard from he fore the way to work at the Maryknoll mission in Chongju.

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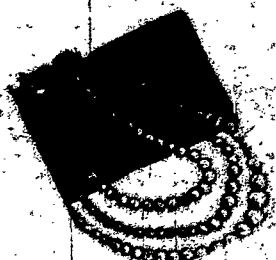
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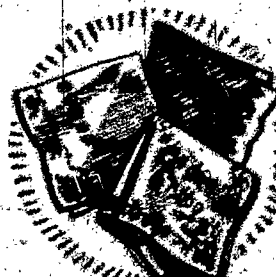
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Anniversary Speaker Lauds Auburn K. of C. Council

AUBURN—The 45th anniversary dinner of the Knights of Columbus has been recorded as one of the outstanding events in the long history of Auburn Council, Raymond

Davis, lecturer, opened the program and introduced William H. Meagher, a charter member, as toastmaster. The invocation was pronounced by Rev. Dr. William E. Owen, pastor of St. Mary's Church and the words of welcome were given by Grand Knight Patrick J. Mullally.

Fitting remarks were made by Dr. Cowan, Howard Franklin of Newark, district deputy; John J. Leo, past district deputy and past grand knight; and Attorney George Shannon, deputy grand knight of Auburn Council.

Pastor Gerard Amann, chaplain of the Council and assistant pastor of St. Alphonsus Church, told the men that the banquet was held on the eve of May, the month dedicated to the Blessed Virgin, and urged the Knights to dedicate the event and their lives to the same cause.

The Seneca Falls Council which was founded by the Auburn Council was represented at the banquet by a large delegation, headed by Grand Knight Thomas Masten and Michael E. Rengan, a past grand knight and a charter member of the Seneca Falls Council.

STRESSES PATRIOTISM

The guest speaker was James Lanigan of Fulton, a past grand knight of that Council. Mr. Lanigan congratulated the Auburn Council on the completion of 45 years of fraternal service in Auburn and said that "Auburn Council holds a high place in the ranks of the order not only in New York State but throughout the Nation."

Part of his address is as follows: "This is no time for perfunctory lip service to the ideal of patriotism. The times demand deeds, not words. The present war is a struggle between two diametrically opposed philosophies: One totalitarian and pagan, and the other democratic and Christian. The Axis powers are endeavoring to eradicate from the earth all traces

of Christian principles and the success of any such program means the abrogation of human rights as we have come to know them in America.

"As Catholics and Knights of Columbus we reject the Axis concept of human nature and of human rights. We cannot and will not agree that man is a beast in thing with no personal rights or dignity, or that the state is supreme over him and can do with him as it will.

STRENGTH IN FAITH

"We insist that man created before the dawn of time has the rights guaranteed him by our constitution and we rebel in righteous anger at any attempt to rob him of this inborn dignity and to reduce him to the level of brute creation. This is a war for the preservation of spiritual values and we should look to our church and our faith for the strength to wage it.

"Now as never before should we realize our complete dependence upon God, and use sincere religious devotion as a weapon in defense of the great ideals of Christianity against the diabolical attacks of the godless enemy nations. We deplore the growth of intolerance and hate in America and we, Knights, should preach and practice tolerance as a living antidote to the pernicious doctrines of racism and class hatred.

"Remember the ideals of charity, fraternity and patriotism on which the order is founded. Accept the challenge to a new crusade for the preservation of American ideals of freedom, not only for this country but for the entire world."
