

Retired Army Chaplain, Known in Auburn, Dies

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Rev. Ignatius Feeley, former U. S. Army chaplain and a frequent visitor in Auburn, died in Washington on Wednesday and was buried there with military honors on Saturday morning.

Father Feeley was a friend of Edward T. Quigley, former Auburnian and now a resident of Washington and often visited at the home of the late William Byrne, father of Election Commissioner, J. Joseph Byrne. He also served as chaplain at Hawaii at the same time that Lieut. Col. William A. Aiken of Auburn, retired Army Chaplain, was stationed there.

Father Feeley was an altar boy at St. Aloysius parish, Washington, 48 years ago and served Mass for His Eminence Francis Cardinal Satolli, the first Apostolic Delegate to the United States. He was the late pastor of St. Agnes Church, Woodlawn, and died at St. Agnes Hospital in Baltimore. The funeral services and burial were attended by soldiers from Fort Myer, who fired a military salute over his grave and "taps" were sounded.

CROWNING OF STATUE

A Polish Traditional Crowning of the Statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary was held in St. Hyacinth's Church on May Day. A beautiful gown studded with pearls and diamonds was made for the occasion, a gift of the Third Order of St. Francis—a women's organization of the parish, was blessed in solemn ceremony before the High Altar. Rev. Jerome Holubowicz, O.M.C. pastor, was master of ceremonies for the Blessing. Rev. Vincent Wabak, O.M.C., celebrant; Rev. Edwin Agnisk, O.M.C., assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church, deacon, and Rev. Conrad Miller, O.M.C., subdeacon. Following the blessing of the crown the procession wended its way through the aisles of the church and finally came to the Altar of the Blessed Virgin Mary where the crown was placed by Miss Mary Grzeska, president of the Children of Mary Sodality. Miss Grzeska was attended by escort ladies and the members of the Children of Mary Sodality, St. Theresa's Guild, Sodality of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Holy Rosary Society and the Third Order of St. Francis, all organizations of the parish took part in the procession. Following the coronation of the Blessed Virgin Mary Devotions were held and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

The Polish people have always had a particular devotion to Mary, the Mother of God. In fact everyone knows of their faith in Mary and the whole world knows the story, a true one of recent years, which is told of Pope Pius XI, who organized an army on the eve of the Feast of the Assumption, an army under the protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On August 14, 1921, the Russian Army was camped outside the City of Warsaw. Nothing could save Poland except prayer. On that evening one hundred thousand Poles formed a great religious procession with Pope Pius XI as leader and marched through the streets of Warsaw to save Poland from the Russians. The Poles will tell you that Mary answered their prayers, for on August 15 the Red Army began to retreat and the country

was saved. Through the long history of the Polish race they have never forgotten the Blessed Virgin, have never failed to honor her and give her the love which is right, fully hers.

The devotion in honor of Our Lady on May Day was one of the most impressive rites in Auburn in many years and the Pulaski Street edifice was filled to capacity with parishioners and friends of the parish. St. Hyacinth's plan to make this Crowning of the Blessed Virgin on May Day an annual event in the parish life.


MAJ. DEVOTIONS
