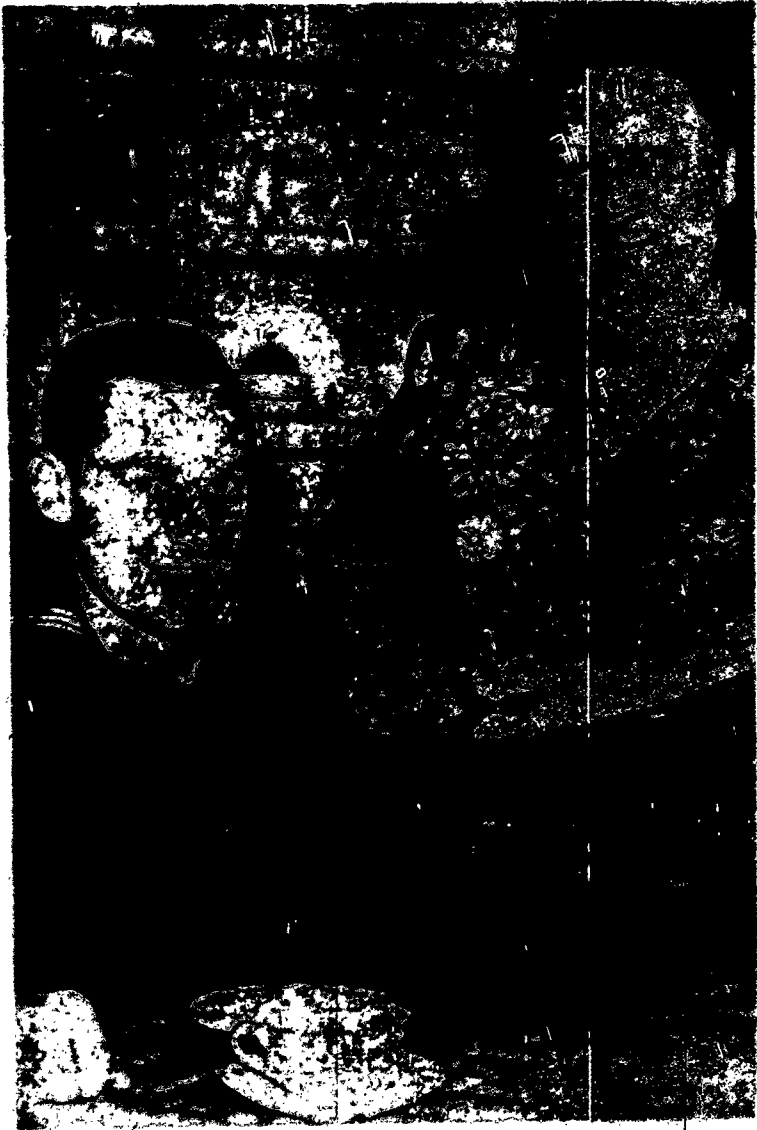
Bishop Kearney To Offer Holy Mass For Mothers Of Men In Armed Forces

A Low Mass for the intention of servicemen's mothers will be offered by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney in St. Joseph's Church, Franklin Street on Thursday morning, May 21 at 9:30 a. m.

The Bishop will preach at the Mass to which are being invited mothers of sons in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard.

Pastors will announce the time and place of the Mass on Sunday from the pulpits.

In various churches of the diocese the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is being offered once a month. Mothers who attend those Masses as well as all other mothers of servicemen are being invited to the Bishop's Mass.

Holy Father Paid Homage Throughout Diocese On 25th Episcopal Jubilee

Tribute To 'Pope Of Peace' Given At Pontifical Mass

"Pius XII will always be known as the Pope of Peace." Thus declared the Rev. John E. Maney of St. Andrew's Seminary faculty, who studied for the Holy Priesthood in Rome, at the solemn Pontifical Mass commemorating the Holy Father's Silver Episcopal Jubilee in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Wednesday, May 12, the anniversary date.

With His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D., Bishop of Rochester officiating, the solemn but joyous liturgical ceremony was conducted as the central offering of prayer in the diocese for His Holiness, Pope Pius XII.

Throughout the diocese special Masses were offered by each priest and the faithful attended these Masses in paying prayerful homage to the Supreme Pontiff. A spiritual bouquet of Masses, Holy Communion and other devotions was prepared by the children in the diocesan schools. (See adjoining column.)

Assisting the Bishop were: Assistant Priest, the Rt. Rev. Mgr. William M. Hart, V.G.; Deacons of Honor, the Rt. Rev. Mgr. William F. Bergan, Chancellor of the diocese, and the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Charles F. Shay; Master of Ceremonies, the Rt. Rev. Mgr. J. F. Goggin. Students of St. Bernard's Seminary filled the minor offices.

Exemplifies Ideals

"The man whose silver jubilee as a Bishop, the world over is celebrating today has exemplified perfectly the ideals of Holy Church," Father Maney declared in his sermon.

Fr. Cleary To Compile Clergyman-Pilot List

ITHACA, N. Y.—(NC)—The Rev. Donald M. Cleary, National Chaplain of the Newman Club Federation and chaplain of the Newman Club at Cornell University, here has been appointed by the national office of the Civil Air Patrol to compile a list of all priests, ministers and rabbis who are airplane pilots.

The list was sought by the Civil Air Patrol in order to encourage these clergymen to take an active part in the patrol's work in their own communities and to lighten by their presence and encouragement the morale of those engaged in this phase of civilian defense. The completed list, Father Cleary said, will include name, address, denomination, number of flying hours, rating and "any other information which would be of news value" for each clergyman.

Catholics Urged To Back 1942 Chest Campaign

With over half a million dollars already reported for the 1942 Community and War Chest campaign, workers are speeding their efforts to attain the goal of \$2,250,000 by Monday night.

The cooperation of every citizen in Rochester and surrounding communities is needed to achieve the goal.

Catholics were called upon to do their share in the campaign by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney who spoke at a solemn High Mass offered in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Sunday morning to ask God's blessings on the campaign's success.

The Bishop said these are the days when, to use the common expression, so many things are "put to the test."

"The courage of our youth is 'put to the test.'" His Excellency said. "The loyalty of our people, the spirit of service to our children, the self sacrifice, the patience and cooperation of our business men, the patriotism and endurance of

our workers, all are 'put to the test.'" In this situation it is to be expected that the greatest of virtues, Charity, must be 'put to the test' also.

"The Chest appeal for 1942 is our largest and most magnificent effort. Its failure would be our most serious disaster," the Bishop warned. "Do not forget that we have a double responsibility—our own agencies at home, the crushed and broken abroad. In the words of our Chest Campaign posters, 'Give for both!'"

The Mass was celebrated Sunday by the Rev. Gerald C. Lambert, diocesan director of Catholic Charities. Deacons of honor were the Rt. Rev. Mgr. George J. Burns and the Rev. Alphonsus F. Crimmins; deacon, the Rev. Joseph E. Vogt; subdeacon, the Rev. Francis E. Burns.

At the close of the Mass a Mother's Day ceremony was conducted with the Sacred Heart Men's Choir participating.
