#### FATHERS, SONS DONE

"Boys don't be afraid to stand up and pray," was the message, stirring given by James E. Cuff, prominent Catholic leader and attorney to the 272 fathers and sons gathered at the Holy Name Society sponsored dinner of Our Lady of Perpetual Help parish.

Held at Rochester Turn Hall, the dinner program was well-balanced with membership in the Holy Name Society, religious practice, patriotism, and sports, especially baseball, stressed.

Principal speaker, Mr. Cuff after paying his tribute to the Rochester Red Wing representatives present, and urging support of the team whether it wins or loses so long as it keeps trying, turned to football terminology in his message to the boys.

No runner, he said, carries the ball without two good blocking backs. "Your blocking backs and interference, against the opponent you know exists, are Confession and Communion." That it was many to pray is a matter of history, he said, and cited men like Louis Pasteur and Roentgen, the X-ray inventor, as examples.

To the tune of "Let's Remember Pearl Harbor," the boys and their dads sang a tribute to the Rev. Francis J. Hoefen, pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church. Father Hoefen welcomed the guests and expressed his gratitude to the Holy Name Society for their loyalty. He also commended the Rochester ball team whom he called "neighbors" and offered his sincere wishes for their success.

Greetings of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union were brought by Frank E. Wolfe, diocesan union president, who announced the forthcoming Holy Name Society membership campaign and lauded the branch at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church as an important unit in the diocesan organization.

and said the team always tries to merit such cooperation.
