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There's NO Master Switch For a Blackout

War Production and Other Essential Services Must Not Be Interrupted

People sometimes ask why we can't blink all the lights in the community as a blackout warning signal and then extinguish them from a "master switch." The answer is that even if this were practical it would do much more harm than good. There are many essential services that must go on regardless of blackouts because the idea can't to eliminate all light from our homes and factories but to prevent interior illumination from being visible on the outside.

There must be constant electric power for war production, industries, hospitals, communications, radio stations, water systems and other public necessities. Radios, clocks, gas or oil burners, cold storage plants, home refrigerators, elevators must all function normally even when the lights are out. That is why there is no "master switch" for a blackout.

The way to observe a blackout with the least interruption of essential services is to prepare a room in your home where you can sit in comfort during the period of outside darkness. Then, when the warning signal comes, turn out the lights in the other rooms. This will allow your radio to operate, your oil or gas furnace to keep going, your refrigerator, electric clock and other appliances to run and produce the minimum amount of disturbance to normal household operations.

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
