For her six children, Mrs. Ruth W. has made a courageous fight and for a time it was successful. There was a long period of unemployment for Mr. W. and his wife said, "That wasn't bad enough, he had to get so discouraged that he started drinking."

"And then," she continued, "Johnny was ill for weeks and I didn't have money for a doctor and he wouldn't let me ask for one from the Charities." Thus her story ran, when she first came to Catholic Charities about two years ago.

Catholic Charities work with this family didn't end when Mr. W. finally found a job with the help of our Visitor. Reports from the school and complaints from the neighbors, supplemented Mrs. W.'s sordid story and it was many a long month before everything that was wrong in that home was straightened out.

The children are now in parochial school, Mr. and Mrs. W. go to Mass and the Sacraments regularly, "interfering" relatives understand that Mr. and Mrs. W. must lead their own lives.

Johnny has had a long farm vacation and is well and strong now. Mrs. W. has had surgery for a serious physical condition, and many other serious problems have been straightened out.

Strange to say, it was Mr. and Mrs. W. who finally decided to "do things different." Of course much had been accomplished in the way of changed attitudes and Mr. and Mrs. W. had come to see some of their actions in quite a different way.

Case stories are recorded in such a way that the identity of the family is protected. Relief cost for above family was high for several months, services during the past year involved a part of our budget supplied annually through the Community Chest Fund of Elmira.
