## 4 Speakers Extol 'Mother' At Communion Breakfasts

About 200 members of St. Patrick's Church, Holy Name Society attended the 10th annual breakfast at the Mark Twain Hotel and heard an address by the Rev. Edward L. Kelly, pastor.

The Rev. Edward L. Kelly, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, spoke. He said: "In this Mass we recall the early days of settlement and relate how the new immigrants came seeking religious freedom only to discover the love of God for their native country Americans. The gifts from heaven they traded for the gifts of the earth," he said. "And that is the trouble with Europe today."

He appealed for all to gather together and knelt under the mantle of the Holy Mother and ask her intercession and protection. "Feel blessed and honored to be here," he said. "Don't go away feeling it's all over and you must go back to the same rut; if so, every effort is in vain."

The occasion also commemorated the 10th anniversary of service in St. Patrick's parish for the pastor, the Rev. William J. Brian, who organized the Holy Name group at St. Patrick's.

Father Brian received a telegram of congratulations from Bishop Keohane and a book from the Society. This book, "Big for the Church" written by Capt. William A. McGuire, U. S. Navy chaplain, deals in part with his experiences in Elmer and mentions Father Brian.

The Rev. Robert Mulry, spiritual adviser of the organization, gave the blessing and introduced toastmaster Captain M. Graves, Member of the Elmira Police.

## Dr. Zwierlein Says Hopes For Freedom Rest On U.S.

ITHACA—The Rev. Dr. Frederick J. Zwierlein, professor emeritus of church history at St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester was a guest speaker at the Communion breakfast of the Church of the Immaculate Conception Sunday morning, May 10, in Victoria Hotel.

Speaking on the topic, "I Am an American," Father Zwierlein pointed out that the President has proclaimed November, Nov. 17, as "I Am an American Day."

"We have seen no better," he said, "in the lack of foresight on the part of the American government at Washington for its unpreparedness to meet the Japanese danger that has proved so disastrous to our forces on land and sea and in the air; despite the heroic deeds of American soldiers, sailors, and aviators; or in the inability of our Navy and Air Forces thus far to destroy the Axis U-boat menace on the Atlantic seaboard or to keep the sea lanes there open for transportation of needed commodities. We can feel no pride in the failure of the federal government to develop vast public works in the years of depression, that would have made us independent and safe from the impending dangers of the sea rocker."

"Despite these deficiencies and many more that might be added," Father Zwierlein said, "we take the greatest pride in being Americans amongst the crumbling democracies in the world today, just as in the immortal word of Lincoln at Gettysburg, government of the people, by the people, and for the people perish from the earth."
