

Pray for Speedy End To Dictators and War, Corning Women Urged

CORNING—County Judge George A. King, guest speaker at the eighth anniversary banquet of the Italian-American Women's Club Saturday evening at 8:30 o'clock at the Baron Steuben Hotel, after being introduced by Mrs. Peter Fratarangelo, president, asked the women to pray that the present world conflict might be brought to a speedy end through the destruction of the ruthless leaders who have plunged their countries into states of chaos in the hope that their own selfish interests might be gratified.

"All nationalistic lines fade into insignificance in the face of the need to crush into the dust the self-appointed dictators who have brought destruction upon us in the hope of achieving fleeting earthly glory," said Judge King to the 100 women and their guests.

The Judge sympathized with those present who have relatives and friends in the war zones and related the tale of Madam Ernes-tine Schumann-Heink whose courage never faltered and who, with her glorious voice, cheered American soldiers during World War I, even though half her sons were fighting under the German flag and half were enlisted under the Stars and Stripes.

Older Aged in War

To the mothers Judge King said what he knew they longed for the return of soldiers to their homes and for a restoration of life free from constant fear of famine and death.

"However," said the speaker, "we may just as easily win the struggle in which we are now engaged and again lose lasting peace unless we view swiftly passing events through clear eyes and stand ourselves to see this war through to the bitter end that another and greater conflict may not involve your grandchildren a quarter of a century hence."

"America," continued the Judge, "Great Britain and the people of all nations are not waging war to crush the people of any other nation, nor to gain territory, nor to make possible an increase in trade but to eliminate forever those who make war for personal glory and personal gain."

Nearer Human Heart

Peace, with security and opportunity to make an honest living and the raising of a family, is nearer the human heart than war and bloodshed, regardless of nationality, the Judge believes. And he has high hopes that the day is not too far away when the men who are responsible for the present war will be called to account.

In conclusion the Judge said "May Mother's Day in 1943 see the dawn of peace hovering over the battlefields now littered with human bodies and rank with the fumes from countless guns and may


