

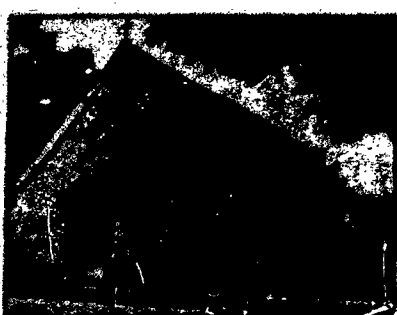
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MARK POPE'S JUBILEE

CITES FAMILY SAFEGUARDS

CORNING.—Reminding his audience that marriage is a sacrament and the home is its tabernacle David Sheehan of Elmira, speaking before the Sodality of Our Lady of Good Counsel of St. Mary's Church Sunday morning at the Baron Stouben Hotel at the Mother's Day breakfast, said that there are two safe guards that must be upheld if the family is to be preserved, namely (1) Catholic atmosphere in the home; (2) Catholic education outside the home.

We have almost lost the sanctity and integrity of the home, Mr. Sheehan declared.

"Years ago," he said, "people could rise up and thunder against birth control and divorce as sins, —and the world knew what they were talking about. But today, because the world no longer believes in marriage as a sacrament, they cannot comprehend the accusation of sins against it. What we speak of as sin, are to a large majority of our citizenry, perfectly legal acts and respectable conditions."

Scores Planned Parenthood
Mr. Sheehan made special reference to the organization known as Planned Parenthood which he says is undermining the marriage state to an even greater extent. "This organization is, he averred, attempting to link up their program with patriotism, saying they want to do away with economic inequality. "But they would do it," he declared, "not by eradicating poverty, but by liquidating the poor."

The speaker said the best way to preserve the dignity of the sacrament of marriage was then to apply the safeguards mentioned above.

The Catholic homes of today are not quite like the ones of a few years ago when grace before meals and the recitation of the rosary in a family group were a daily part of the program.

"Religion and modernity are supposed to be incompatible — and since all of us are anxious to keep up with the times, to avoid being referred to as 'old fogies,' we sometimes compromise our religious sense to a sense of what is smart and modern. If we allow our most intimate surroundings to go pagan, they can easily influence us subconsciously to the point where we too are liable to go pagan."

Mr. Sheehan suggested a list of

things to help in keeping a Catholic atmosphere such as a holy water font inside the door of each bedroom; the lighting of a holy candle in times of storm or trouble; grace before and after meals; family prayers.

In referring to the necessity for Catholic education outside the home Mr. Sheehan said "A communitarianism in one of our universities is infinitely more dangerous than a battalion of armed invaders. For the armed invader uses brute force and strikes at our physical well-being, while the Anti-Christ teachers use pseudo-science for their weapon and attack the souls of all innocents exposed to them."

Urges Catholic Education
Mr. Sheehan said he believes a Catholic secondary education is necessary for all Catholics when possible in order to round out and fill a complete Catholic personality. He feels it is the duty of the Catholic parents not to ignore an opportunity for Catholic education.

Seated at the speaker's table were the Rev. John C. Newcomb, moderator of the Sodality; Rev. John Albert, assistant pastor, St. Mary's Church; Mrs. David Sheehan, Elmira; Miss Mary Hill, president; Rose Parenti, vice president; Marion Burrell, secretary; Frances Morachob, treasurer; Madeline Stanger, chairman for the breakfast; Henrietta Paul, co-chairman.

Father Newcomb gave the blessings and when called upon by Miss Hill said that he was greatly pleased with the number of mothers present. He spoke of plans for a May celebration by the Sodality and suggested that the organization would continue its activities through the summer months instead of concluding its program at the present time.

Father Newcomb called upon Father Albert who responded briefly.

Group singing was enjoyed by everyone and at the conclusion the hymn Mother Dear, O Pray For Me and the national anthem were sung.

Miss Stanger presented Miss Hill with a Miraculous Medal on a gold chain, the gift of the Sodality to its president.
