

Owego Boy Wins Diocesan Spelling Contest Honors

Captures First Prize In Catholic Courier Sponsored Matches

St. Patrick's School, Owego, won diocesan honors when its contestant, Thomas O'Connor, refused to be spelled down last Saturday and won the first prize after a two and a half hours' ordeal.

Young Thomas O'Connor with 22 other contestants from as many Catholic schools of various parts of the diocese, vied in the diocesan finals at De Sales High School, Geneva, before an audience of friends and teachers.

Doris Kohls of St. Boniface School, Rochester, was runner up and won the second prize. Eleanor Chapula of Holy Cross School, Rochester, came in third.

The spelling demons like "steve" and "receive" held no terrors for these spelling champions but the "Philippines" and "Portugal" took their toll.

This spelling contest sponsored by the CATHOLIC COURIER under the auspices of the Diocesan Superintendent of Schools proved a very worthwhile innovation according to Father Duffy. Through it a new interest in spelling was stimulated. The experience of the children who, successful in regional contests, made the finals in Geneva, was an important and enjoyable one. Procation for the opening of May was held Friday night, May 1, under the auspices of Our Lady's committee of the Sodality at St. Joseph's Hospital.

Mrs. Florence Healy, Prefect of the Sodality, and Miss Katherine Hussey, Vice-Prefect, were in charge of the arrangements for the observance. On each of five floors, beginning on ninth floor with the Annunciation, a tableau presentation of the Five Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary was given. Reuniting the Rosary as they walked from floor to floor of the Dunn Memorial Building, carrying lighted tapers and flowers, the girls made an impressive appearance. The characters depicting the Joyful Mysteries were appropriately attired in costumes of the period when Christ walked the earth. Spotlights were used effectively to illuminate the scene on each floor and the rest of the

corridor was in comparative darkness except for the flickering light of the Sodalists' candles.


