U. S. Called to Staff World Missions Is Rally Message

Missionaries in S. A. A real attempt to further good relations between North and South America is being made by our missionaries, Father Magner told his group. He stated that a greatly increased number of missionaries are being sent to the Latin American countries.

In the sermon at the Bishop's Mass, Father Coogan said: "Today as spiritual crusaders, we pray with the Holy Father that the present eclipse of evil which is hiding the sun of justice and charity from a darkened war-ridden world may soon pass and that the peace of Christ may reign in the hearts of men, that the motto of Pius XII may be engraved upon the fleshy tablets of human hearts, 'pax through justice.'"

"Pius XII views this World War situation from the eternal hill-top of Vatican City," the preacher said. "As his blessing is imparted to the city and to the world, we his spiritual crusaders in heart and mind today pay a visit to that city seated upon a hill-top overlooking the world, that we may gain not a parochial or a diocesan but a world-wide vision of the Church."

"We are well aware of the fact that there are Catholics who prefer not to take this universal, Catholic world-wide view of the Church of Christ, but that is because they are not conscious of the part they are playing in the mystical body of Christ."

"In Christ," Father Coogan said, "there is neither bond nor free. Home and foreign missions, therefore, are only arbitrary titles which attach to lands near and far. In Christ there is neither home nor foreign missions. All souls are His divinely constituted flock."

Nazareth-Aquinas French Students To Present Two One-Act Plays

Nazareth and Aquinas seniors will again collaborate this year in presenting two one-act French plays Tuesday evening, May 28, in the Nazareth Academy Auditorium.

The first play, "Simone Fait Bonne Impression" is the story of a young lady who meets the hero of her dreams while on vacation from the department store where she is a clerk. What happens when she seeks her out later at the modest apartment where she lives with her family, makes an exciting climax to this comedy.

The leading role of Simone is played by Doris Anne Flaherty. The supporting cast includes Roseanne Forward, Palma Falozzi, Constance Pelix, Paulette Bielle, Eleanor Del Vecchio, Margaret Pritchard, Frederick Raes, and Jack Nothnagie.

In "Absent le Chat, les Souris Dansent," the second play, maids who impersonate mistresses, learn that "Murder will out" in the end. Mary Oliver, as Mariette, a servant in the Marconnet family finds herself wound up in an inextricable maze of difficulties when she accepts the challenge of the other

servants, Father Coogan pointed out that in France 37,500 priests had served in the army as soldiers and that 2,000 parishes were practically without priestly administration. He asked conditions in Germany and Spain, Belgium and Poland quoting figures and said America only supplies about 5 per cent of the total of foreign missionaries. He mentioned the number of native priests in China where 2,000 out of 6,000 priests are Chinese and 6,000 Sisters are native Chinese.

Church in Japan The story of missionary progress in Japan was brought by the Rev. Harold Felsecker, M.S., who returned last August after 19 years in the Maryknoll missions in Japan.

Italian and German Catholic missionaries are still at work in Japan, "but what they are living on, we don't know; all their funds are cut off," he declared. He cited the personal sacrifices being made by the Japanese people as a result of war and said "they accepted these and other sacrifices readily as their patriotic duty," and added Americans haven't learned a thing about sacrifice by comparison.

Father Felsecker put the blame for the war on the military clique in Japan and said the people themselves are likeable and as late as last August "could see no reason for war between the United States and Japan."

With representatives of Nazareth College and Niagara University, the high schools and grammar schools present, the rally was brought to a close with a tea dance from 4:30 to 7 P. M.

Directing arrangements for the rally was the Rev. John S. Randall, diocesan director, Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Miss Margaret Meers of Nazareth College was chairman.
