FINAL TRIBUTE TO NUN

HORNELL.—A tribute was paid at all the Masses last Sunday to Sister Mary Aid, whose funeral was held Tuesday morning at 10:30 o'clock. Sister M. Aid died at St. James Mercy Hospital on May 17, after a long illness. For the past five years, Sister M. Aid had been invalided as a result of a fractured hip. She was 88 years of age. Sister M. Aid had been affiliated with the staff of St. James Mercy Hospital for 43 years. For four years she was superintendent until ill health forced her to withdraw from the activity of that position. For about 20 years, Sister M. Aid was in charge of X-Ray work. She also served in many other capacities.

Sister M. Aid was born in Ireland. In 1889, she entered into the religious vocation in the Mother House of the Sisters of Mercy. She was professed at Rochester three years later. In the fall of the same year she came to Hornell.

Many visiting priests and nuns attended funeral services for Sister M. Aid. Members of the Board of Managers of St. James Mercy Hospital, also the Medical Staff, Women's Board, Nurses Alumnae and Junior Auxiliary of the Hospital attended the services in a body.

Sister M. Aid is survived by two brothers, Cornelius Leary of Buffalo, and Patrick Leary of Ithaca, two sisters in Ireland and several nieces and nephews.

AURIESVILLE, N. Y.—(NC)—Commemoration of the tercentenary of the death of the first North American Martyr, St. Rene Goupil, will be the most important event of the fifty-seventh pilgrimage season at the Auriesville Shrine our Lady of Martyrs which opened today.

The first of the eight North American martyr-saints to be slain was tomahawked at the Mohawk Indian village of Ossernenon in eastern New York, Sept. 29, 1642.

The principal observance of the martyrdom tercentenary will be on Sunday, Sept. 27, when a general pilgrimage from New York City and other points in the Eastern States will be made and the Most Rev. Edmund F. Gibbons, Bishop of Albany, will pontificate.
