The Rev. Mr. Starks received the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Niagara University in June, 1938. Continuing his studies in the Seminary of Our Lady of Angels he attained the degree of Master of Arts from Niagara University in June, 1940. During his seminary career he furthered catechetical instruction among the youth of the Buffalo Diocese and was one of the promoters of the "Pastoral Festivals," a series of religious instructions by correspondence between seminarians and children from remote districts of the Albany Diocese and Adirondack Mountains.

The young priest will offer his first Solemn Mass on Sunday, May 31, at 11 o'clock at St. Monica's Church. He is one of six children of Mrs. Ella Mansfield Starks of Elmford Avenue and the late Leo A. Starks, one time city insurance Consultant and Company representative for over 25 years.

Mr. Starks died but ten weeks prior to his son's ordination, and was buried from St. Monica's Church where he had been a charter usher and member for thirty years. On Sunday afternoon the priest and his family will hold a reception at the home from 4 to 7 P. M., and on Monday he will offer his first requiem Mass at 8:30 A. M. at St. Monica's for his deceased father.
