

Registration Opens For Camp Villa Maria

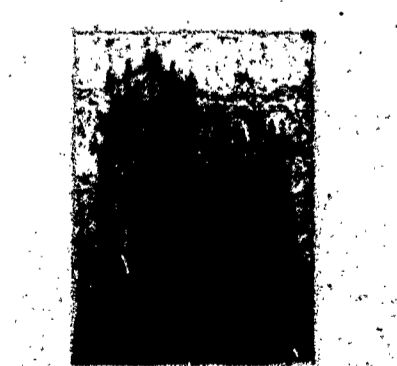
