A graduate of St. Mary's Parochial School, Mrs. Simonson attended Corning Free Academy and both she and her husband are employed at the Corning Glass Works.

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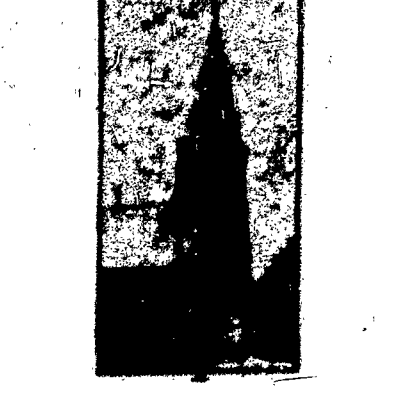
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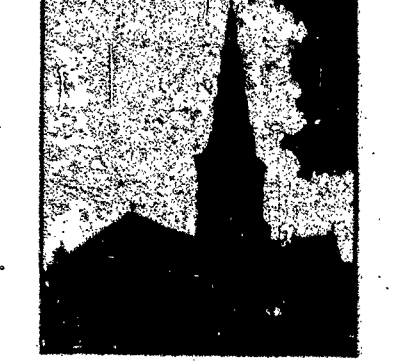
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FIRST SOLEMN MASS

HORNELL.—The Rev. Benedict Francis Riccardo, O.F.M., son of Mr. and Mrs. Felix Riccardo, who was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Joseph M. Corrigan, rector of Catholic University at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D. C., on Thursday, May 23, will offer his First Solemn Mass next Sunday at St. Ann's Church at 11 o'clock. The Rev. Andrew T. Dissett, pastor, will be the archpriest at the Mass, and the Rev. John O'Malley, assistant, will be deacon. The Rev. James A. Schuck, O.F.M., of St. Bonaventure College, will assist as subdeacon.

The sermon at the Mass will be preached by the Rev. Benjamin Kuhn, O.F.M., Professor of Mathematics and Chemistry, Siena College at Albany. The choir of St. Ann's Church, under direction of Mrs. Karl Reitnauer, organist, will render the music for the Mass.

Father Benedict Riccardo attended St. Ann's Parochial School, graduating in 1930. After three years at Hornell High School, he began his preparatory studies for the priesthood at St. Joseph's Seminary at Callicoon. He entered the Franciscan Novitiate at Paterson, N. J., in 1934. A year later, Father Benedict Riccardo made his profession of simple vows. He later studied at St. Stephen's Monastery at Croghan and at St. Anthony's Monastery at Butler, N. J., where he received the Bachelor of Arts degree. In 1939, he began his study of theology at Holy Name College, Washington. A year later, he made his profession of solemn vows.

Father Benedict Riccardo has been doing post-graduate work in

biology at St. Bonaventure College and plans to continue his work there this summer. In September of this year, Father Riccardo will return to Holy Name College to complete his final year of theology.

Next Sunday afternoon there will be a reception in his honor at the Federation Building in Hornell.

First Communion

A class of 28 children of St. Ann's parish received their First Holy Communion last Sunday at the 8:30 o'clock Mass. The group presented a very impressive sight as they entered the Sanctuary in twos, a boy and a girl together, and received Holy Communion underneath a huge floral arch.
