Church Stands Beside Flag, Bishop Tells Service Mothers

Speaking only words of praise for the boys in the Armed Forces, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, at the first of several Masses which will be offered for the Mothers of Uncle Sam's Boys, declared that "The Catholic Church has always taken her stand beside the flag of the country. Without fear, the Cross of Christ stands beside the Stars and Stripes."

More than two thousand mothers of Rochester's servicemen attended this Mass which was held in St. Joseph's Church on Thursday, May 21. Bishop Kearney was celebrant of the Mass and he was assisted by the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey and the Rev. Stephen Aubach, C.S.S.R.

Stating that this war has become more than a commercial affair, the Bishop stated that "This war has crystallized as a war against the enemies of Christ; we have no hesitation in asking God to bless our men and their arms."

"We want no peace that will close our churches, that would deny to us religious education, for our children or dispensation of the Sacraments of God to our people. The situation today is not the product of politics, but the fault of education and the schools. The state of affairs in Germany was not produced by Hitler, but by the materialism of the past century."

Bishop Kearney assured the mothers that "we will join in storming heaven with prayers for a just peace and for the restoration of our boys to their families. This practice cannot help but attract in a special way the eye and ear of Jesus and Mary, and their influence scatters over land and sea."

Pontifical Mass Marks Msgr. Goggin Jubilee

Solemn Pontifical Mass was celebrated by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney in St. Bernard's Seminary, Sunday morning, in honor of the 40th Sacerdotal Jubilee of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John F. Goggin, Ph.D., S. T. D., rector of the Seminary.

Besides the faculty and student body the only others present at the ceremony is keeping with the Jubilarian's retiring disposition were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, V.G., and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William F. Bergan, Chancellor of the diocese.

Monsignor Goggin, a native of Palmyra, started his teaching career at St. Bernard's in September, 1902, on his return from Rome where he had been ordained.

In Rome he had attended the North American College and there received his doctor of philosophy degree from the Academy of St. Thomas and his degree of doctor of sacred theology in May, 1902, from the Propaganda University in Rome. He was ordained in that year at the Basilica of St. Peter in Rome.

Becoming rector of St. Bernard's Seminary in February, 1922, Dr. Goggin was elevated by His Holiness, Pope Pius XI to the rank of Domestic Prelate with the title of Monsignor.
