

First Communion In Scipio and Genoa

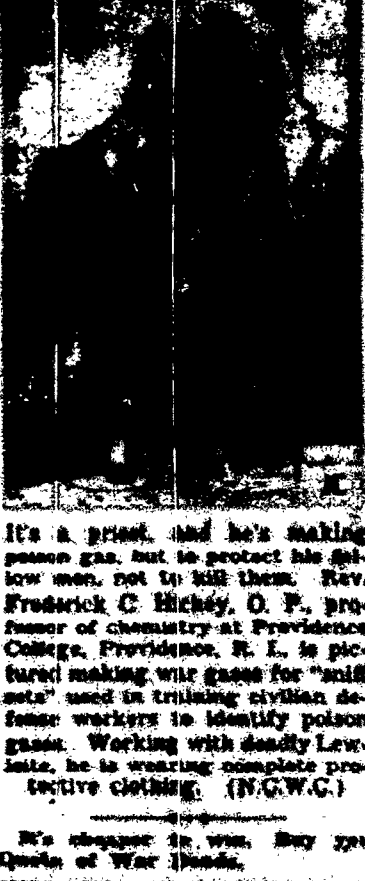

MANHATTAN.—The Most Rev. Julius Gallego, Archbishop of Tuolumne, has issued a special instruction on Catholic Action to adults. At present, in his Archdiocese the groups comprising the Catholic Action movement are more or less autonomous and independent organizations. He has called for a general instruction on adult Catholic Action, which will be issued by the Archbishop and all priests collaborate by joining their parish leagues.
