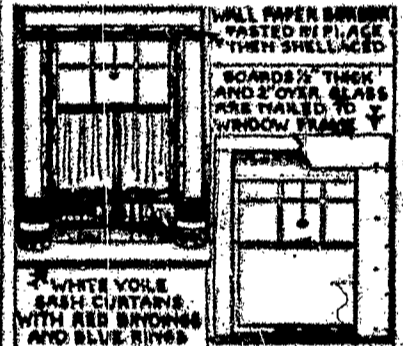
Known to her friends as "Betty" Odell, she was an honor student in her class at Nazareth College, two years ago.

Gay Frames for Kitchen Windows
This new style of framing windows with boards gaily decorated, started with the black-out drills. The boards prevent light from showing around the edges of dark shades. The style is especially attractive and practical for kitchen windows as the frame gives the effect of colorful draperies, yet may be washed with a damp cloth.

This window strikes a patriotic note with blue paint and a red, white and blue border. Clear unlined shalac is used. A blue shelf under the window has notches to hold knives and mixing spoons.
