SODALITY RECEPTION

WATKINS GLEN—A function which will never be effaced from their memories for its solemnity and beauty, was witnessed by the people of St. Mary's of the Lake Church when thirty-two young ladies were received into the Sodality of the Blessed Virgin. This celebration, coinciding with the feast of the Blessed Trinity, was a spectacular and unusual event in this parish, not having been observed for more than a quarter of a century.

This day of particular devotion to the Blessed Mother commenced with the reception of Holy Communion by all the members in a body, at the first Mass, which was followed by a communion breakfast at the convent.

Later, heaven smiled a sunny approval as the hour neared for a second happy reunion of the girls at the Jefferson Hotel where they dined. Their loved pastor, Rev. Thomas Carroll, was their chief and honored guest. With just pride he viewed the happy faces of his spiritual daughters before him, recalling the baptism, communion and confirmation of each one. The dinner came to a close as Father Carroll with paternal affection congratulated them on their good will and spirit.

The candidates could hardly subdue their enthusiasm as the time drew near for the "crowning" which would culminate the festivities of the day.

At the appointed hour, the young maidens, wearing light summer formals, followed their queen, Miss Elizabeth Nichols in bridal attire, and her two attendants, Miss Jane Belligott and Miss Queenie Moscon dressed in blue, into the church. The procession was headed by Miss Sylvia Butteraxi carrying a satin pillow upon which was the crown of blossoms. The "Ave Maria Stella" was sung as they slowly wended their way through the aisles of the church. The colorful hues of the different gowns seemed like a rainbow against the gold background of the newly decorated sanctuary as they knelt at the foot of the altar, and in clear, firm voices responded to the questions asked them by the pastor, and made their solemn promises. Miss Elizabeth Nichols, president of the group, recited aloud the Act of Consecration to the Blessed Virgin. As each girl received her insignia, a medal of the Immaculate Mary, the high school girls of the Ideal Social Group sang "Mother, at Your Feet I Kneeling."

Father Carroll spoke feelingly from a heart full of joy at the display of love and devotion on the part of the youth of his parish. He emphasized the nobility, the privileges and the responsibilities of the new title they had assumed. He lauded their past faithfulness and urged that ensuing years would prove their fidelity of sterling worth, thus assuring themselves of their Heavenly Mother's love and protection.

Once again arranged in the center aisle, the Socialists raised their feet, long-stemmed roses to form an arch beneath which the Queen proceeded to the Blessed Mother's altar to place the crown upon her head. As couples they approached the altar and deposited their flowers in vases prepared for them.

Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament brought the eventful day to a close.

Sees Aggression Encouraged By Dwindling Population

LONDON.—"A dwindling population does not cure unemployment, nor does it make for peace," said the Rev. Dr. John Carmel Heenan, noted writer and broadcaster, in a speech at Liverpool. "On the contrary," he added, "it encourages aggression and causes war."

He believed the day would come when they would look back with amazement at a system which allowed a man to be paid with no thought of family obligations and the debt which the country owes him as a father of children.

The question of Britain's declining population is attracting increasing attention here. Letters are appearing in the British drawing attention to the country's needs after the war.

The Catholic papers are criticizing the authorities for allowing the open sale and advertisement of contraceptives, and are calling for measures to remove the various positive discouragements to parenthood.
