ARCHBISHOP SEYMOUR PAPAL NUNCIO TO CHURCH

VATICAN CITY — His Excellency the Most Rev. Maurice Silvestri, Papal Nuncio to the Dominican Republic and Haiti, has been appointed Papal Nuncio to Chile by His Holiness Pope Pius XII.

Born in 1892, Archbishop Silvestri was named Nuncio to the Dominican Republic and Haiti in 1938. His activities in promoting the settlement of a boundary dispute between the two countries were particularly appreciated.

Priest Merits Engineer's License

PROKOPIEV, IND.—The Rev. Russell Macdonald, attached to the Building Commission of the Diocese of Brooklyn, last Friday became the first priest in New York State and possibly in the country to hold a professional engineer's license. He received it at a meeting of the State Board of Engineers in the State Office Building here.

Father Macdonald, who is 37 years old, was graduated from St. Francis Xavier University in Nova Scotia in 1933. He came to New York soon afterwards to do technical work for the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, subsequently attending the School of Engineering at New York University.

In 1937, he joined the Army Corps of Engineers, serving in the Philippines.
