NEW YORK (NC)—The Society for the Return of the Faith is the designation given the chaplains corps of the American armed forces by the Rev. August F. Gearhead, an Air Corps Chaplain at Hamilton Field, Calif.

In a letter to the National Office of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, Father Gearhead, who is a Colonel, writes that the armed forces present a promising new field for missionary endeavor. "I would call the Chaplains Corps," Father Gearhead writes, "The Society for the return of the Faith. If there is a mission field ripe and ready for the harvest it is the Army. What makes the work so appealing is the ease with which men will return to the Sacraments if they are only asked. The prayers of our good people are bringing the grace of God to these men, and I cannot tell you how much I enjoy the work."

## CHURCH GROUPS ORGANIZE PRESS ADVISORY BODY TO AID DEFENSE BOND SALES

WASHINGTON—Representatives of groups in the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish churches have organized a press advisory committee to assist the Press Section of the War Savings Staff here in the promotion of sales of United States War Savings Bonds and Stamps.

Members of the committee are Donald T. Sheehan, Director of Public Relations of the National Catholic Community Service; John L. Fortson, Director of Public Relations of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America; and Bernard Postel, Publicity Director of B'nai B'rith.

Mr. Sheehan, a native of Winsted, Conn., was Director of the Bureau of Information, National Catholic Welfare Conference, and was loaned by that organization to the N.C.C.B.

Zone Adjutant Alfred Patrick, Chief Adjutant Edward G. Seik, Joseph Coffey and Jack Dempsie, captain and lieutenant respectively of the auxiliary police of Zone 1.

The principal address was given by Rev. Dr. William E. Cowan, pastor of St. Mary's Church who said in part:

"It is a great pleasure to be with you men and it affords me an opportunity of expressing my appreciation of the things you have been doing for home defense, and for the comfort of our citizens of this community. It has not been easy for in the beginning many people were indifferent. Some regarded it as unnecessary and others viewed it cynically as a game of make believe. One of your first tasks was to educate the people and create a sympathetic understanding of the matter of Home Defense and the means necessary for its practical realization.

"You have been assiduously in earnest in attending your meetings and in doing your utmost to fit yourself by practical knowledge to meet that responsibility. There is still a very long road to travel, much work to be done and drilling to be gone through with. But your sense of responsibility, your love of country and for your city will carry you through satisfactorily. It has been fortunate indeed that these plans for defense have been under the direction of the Police Department.

"This department has the confidence of the citizens, a wide experience and power of organization. You men of Zone Three have been indeed fortunate to have had Captain Arnold as your leader. No man in this zone has been more active and more interested or more thoroughly in earnest in this matter. You men of Zone Three have won a proud place for yourself and I trust you will go on in this great devotion to your work. I think every community united and organized and animated by unselfish devotion to our just and worthy cause would bring us to victory and a just peace."

## Cuban K. of C. Condemn Evil Presentations

SANTIAGO, Cuba (NC)—Some 300 delegates attended the nineteenth annual convention of the Cuban Knights of Columbus held here with the Most Rev. Valentin Zubizarreta, Archbishop of Santiago, presiding. A general Commission Mass was celebrated in the National Sanctuary of the Virgin of Charity, Patroness of Cuba. A wreath in memory of the "Martyrs of Independence" was placed at the tomb of Jose Marti. Sensational press and publications and the theater and screen that goes to extremes in presenting immoral scenes of passion and immoral living in general, were condemned in a resolution which recommends a "Christian reaction" against such undesirable publicity. The Convention voted to establish a fund for the encouragement of large families and to create a Labor Bureau, under the control of the State Council, for the service of persons or organizations desiring to secure competent employees of good moral character. It was voted that annually on the Feast of St. John Baptist, Vespers, the beloved Our Lady, collections will be taken up in all the parishes for the support of the Cuban seminaries.

## Restoration of Dunkerque Church Held Impossible

MARVILLE—The Historical Commission of the North, it has been learned here, has decided that it will be impossible to restore the St. Eloi Church at Dunkerque which was so badly damaged during the battle in June, 1940. The people of the city, however, still hope that his edifice, so intimately associated with the history of the town, may yet be saved. The walls stand, as well as the beautiful interior columns and the general architectural lines are preserved. The tomb of Jean Bart (1680-1722), the French hero who was a native of Dunkerque, is near the main altar.

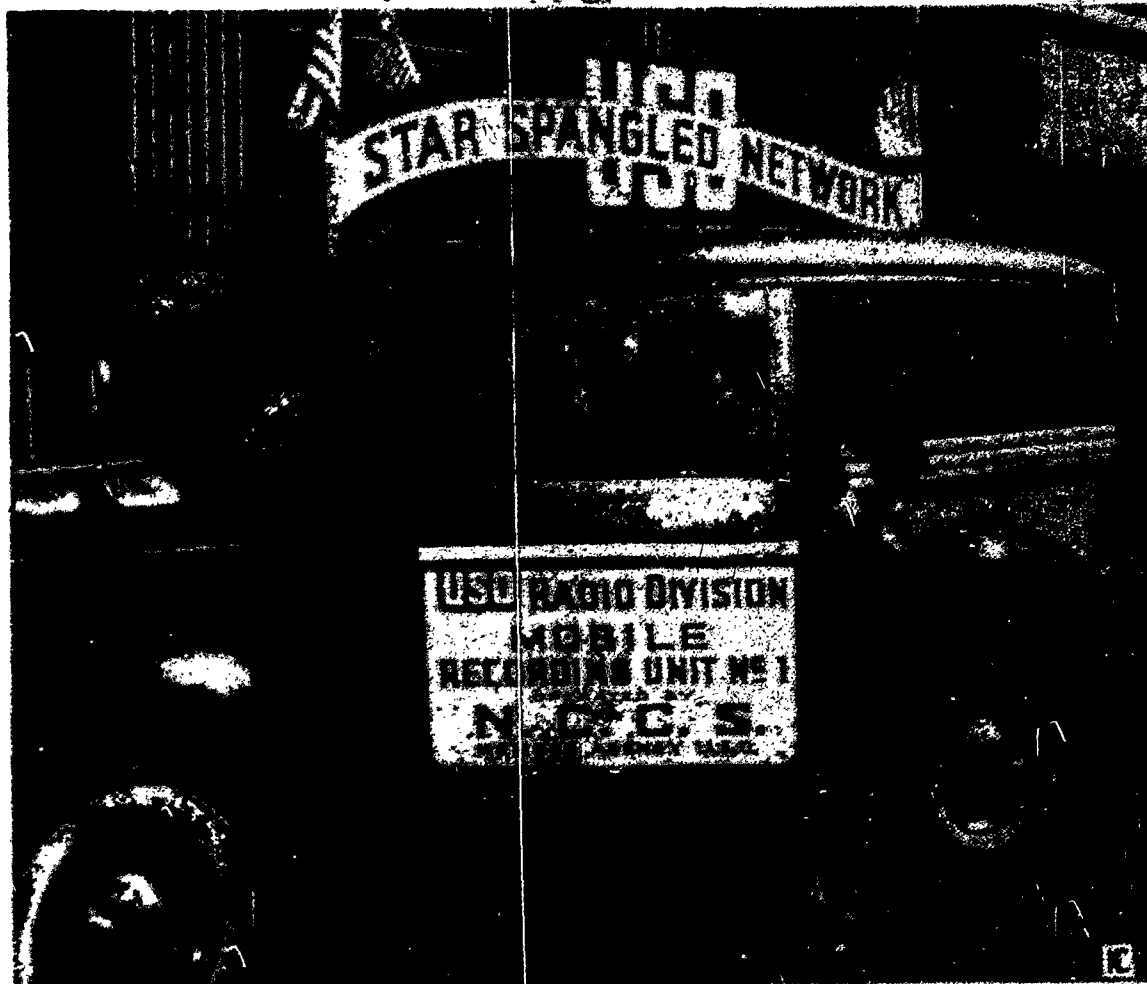
## PRAY FOR PEACE
