SINGS FIRST MASS

AUBURN — Rev. Edward Shamon, a parishioner of St. Aloysius Church, will be ordained to the priesthood by Most Rev. James E. Kearney in the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart on Saturday morning and will celebrate his First Solemn Mass in his home parish on Sunday morning, June 7, at 10:30. Father Shamon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Shamon of 18 Derby Ave., a graduate of St. Aloysius' School, the Auburn High School and St. Andrew's Seminary in Rochester. The Shamon family have always been active participants in the parish life of St. Aloysius. Two years ago this June, Rev. Albert A. Shamon, twin brother of the newly ordained priest celebrated his First Solemn High Mass in St. Aloysius Church. He is at present assistant pastor at St. Thomas Church in Irondequoit. Father Edward Shamon has been active in the Columbian Squires Organization during his summer vacations, having served as counselor at Camp Columbus during the past few years. He was an outstanding member of the Class of 1934 of the Auburn High School and served as president of his class.

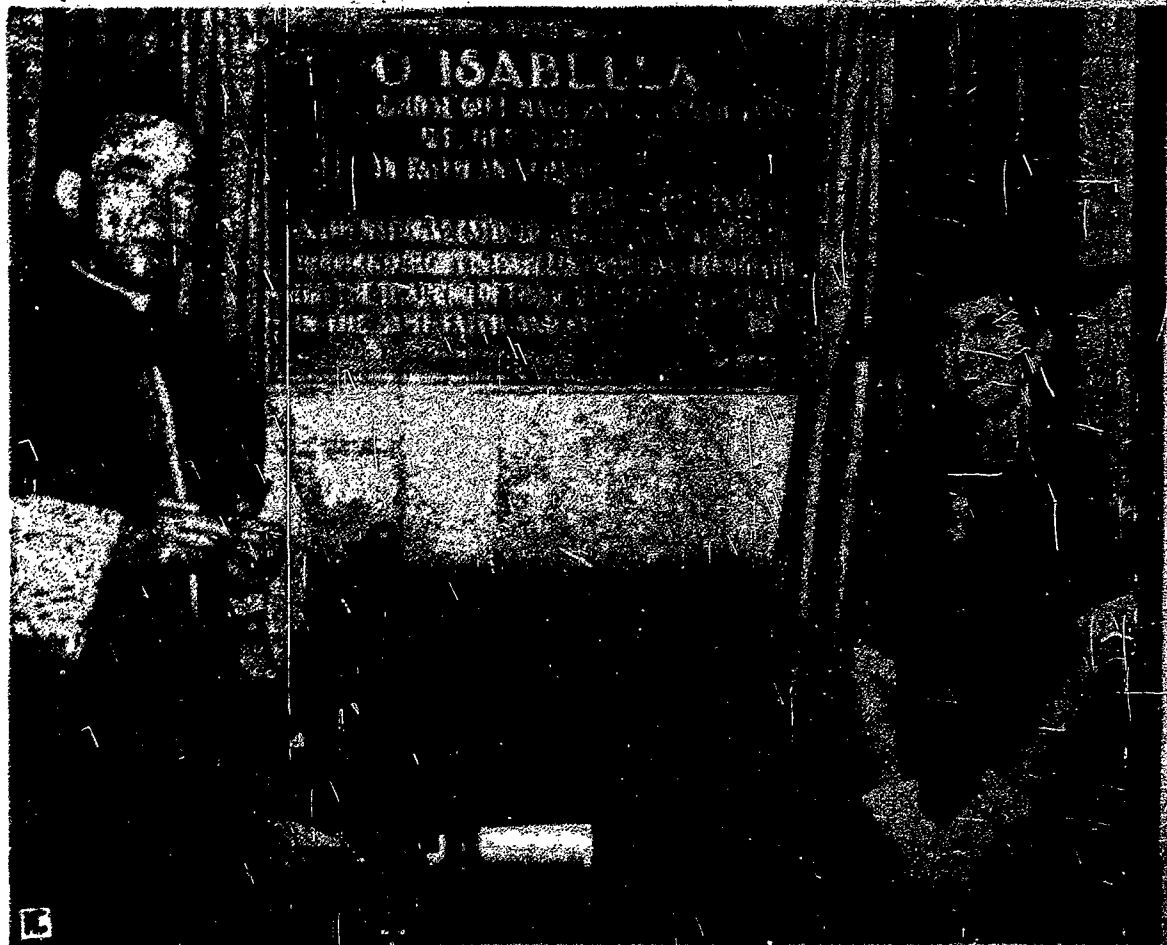
Former Melokai Missioner Notes Golden Jubilee
