

K. of C.-Shriners Plan Huge War Relief Benefit

Military Pageant, Ball Game Stated At Stadium, June 10

One of the most colorful spectacles ever presented at the Knights of Columbus-Damascus Shrine will be presented at the Red Wing Stadium, Wednesday evening, June 17 as a part of "War Week" activities. Practically every uniformed fraternal unit in Rochester will take part in a semi-military parade and pageant preceding the baseball game between the Newark Bears and Rochester Red Wings.

Among the groups already enlisted are several commanderies of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John, under command of Col. Frederick J. Wegman; Masonic bodies will include Damascus patrol, the Legion of Honor, the Chanters, and LaSalle Grotto patrol. Other fraternal units to be seen will be the Elks, the Eagles, the Moose, the Redmen, the Knights of Pythias, the Odd Fellows and several others. Many of these societies will be accompanied by their own musical organizations. Leo F. Lombard is in charge of the parade and pageant.

Arrangements are being made for the personal appearance of a nationally known celebrity. Massing of the colors, playing by massed bands and choral singing of the National Anthem will be a part of the program. Proceeds of the affair will, through an agreement with President Oliver French of the local baseball club, be turned over to the war relief funds of the sponsoring organizations.

Grand Knight Joseph P. Flynn is chairman of the general committee and he is being assisted by Thomas H. O'Connor, Paul A. Fredmore, Otto A. Shultz, Leo F. Lombard and Frank M. Beauchamp, representing the Knights of Columbus; Blustein Potentate Thomas R. Allen, Ralph K. Richardson, James D. Hoary, J. Herbert Kuelber and Alfred E. Daily, representing Damascus Shrine.

Original Ideas Worked Out In Aquinas 'Areté'

With many original ideas carried out, the 1942 edition of The Areté, Aquinas Institute Senior Annual, has made its appearance. Bound in a handsome green cover, the book has an attractive typographical make-up with the green color motif being carried throughout to lighten the black and white. Original illustrations printed in green ink are used to denote the various departments. Individual photos of the 27 seniors are attractively arranged six on a page, with each three separated by the school motto "Credo Quodquid Dixit, Vol. Filius, and the words "Aquinas Institute, Class of 1942."

The dedication of the 1942 Areté to His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, takes on an unusual form in that it is personally directed to the Bishop. The dedication recalls to His Excellency, his entire career and highlights achievements as Shepherd of the Diocese of Rochester. The dedication closes with these words:

"May it ever serve as a token of our respect and love, and our thanks for your services in the past and the present, and for the countless blessings which, through your prayers and sacrifices as a captain of Christ's shock troops on earth, shall pour on us in the future from the Fountain of Grace."

Posed and snapshot photos of the faculty, photographs of classes, the many clubs, the musical organizations, dramatic scenes and of the athletic teams are carefully placed. The Variety Show staged by the Aquinas students this year is featured. Snapshots of the Basilian Fathers in charge of the school taken on the grounds of their new home, the former Nazareth College, appear in this issue.

Brief but well written articles touch on the Mission Activity, toll of the Aquinas School Nurse, Miss Naylon, and recall Francis Cullinan, the Aquinas Institute graduate who died at the age of 24 a Jesuit, but who "did not miss his chance."

Catholic High Students Win All City Prizes In Gannett Essay Contest

Attaining a rare distinction, seven Catholic high school students emerged victorious in competition with public schools and carried off all the city prizes in the first annual Gannett Competition for essays on the Constitution of the United States.

Numbered among the 469 contestants, Adelaide Mary Gundell of Holy Rosary parish, a Nazareth Academy Junior, was awarded the \$100 War Bond for first place.

An Aquinas Senior, Vincent Our Lady of Good Counsel parish won third place, a \$75 War Bond; two Our Lady of Mercy High Seniors, Marion Hyland, St. Michael's parish, and Jean Cappellino Our Lady of Mt. Carmel parish, won second and fifth places, respectively, with a \$75 bond for Marion and a \$25 bond for Jean.

With Miss Gundell, three other Nazareth Academy Juniors won prizes. They are Rosemary Heilmann, Holy Family Parish; Mary Catherine Ragon, St. John's Parish, Greece; and June Fischer, Our Lady of Good Counsel Parish, each winning a \$25 bond.

A bronze head of Lincoln by Gutzen Borglum awarded for a year's possession to the school gaining the greatest number of credits in annual competition goes to Nazareth Academy.

Adelaide Gundell's essay was on "Who Should Tell the Editor What To Print?" Vincent Weltzer and June Fischer wrote on "A Man's Right To Speak His Mind" Mary Catherine Ragon's essay topic was "The Constitution and Private Business." "Who Decides What the Constitution Means?" was chosen by Rosemary Heilmann. The Judging Committee included Charles H. Carver head of Monroe High School's English Department; County Court Judge H. Douglass Van Duser, Supreme Court Justice Lewis A. Gilbert, Verne A. Bird, assistant superintendent of schools; the Rev. Chas. J. Mahoney, associate superintendent, Catholic Schools, Diocese of Rochester; Representative Joseph J. O'Brien, and the Rev. Joseph C. Wurzer, pastor of the Church of the Holy Ghost, Cold Water School Commissioner John E. Keenan was chairman of the judges.
