A glowing tribute to the memory of the late Mrs. Theresa Ganster, Supreme President of the Knights of St. John, Ladies Auxiliary, was paid by the Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Gaff, Chaplain of the Rochester Regiment at the District Commandery meeting, Friday night at headquarters, Franklin St.

"She led in righteousness in a good, loyal cause," Father Gaff said in extolling her quality of leadership. Her method of conducting meetings was a marvelous achievement, he said. Mrs. Ganster was an outstanding figure in the eastern part of the nation.

"Her monument," Father Gaff declared, "is that wonderful body of Catholic women, not only in the parishes, but as a unit throughout the nation which was developed by her influence, enthusiasm and organizing ability."

His Excellency Bishop Kearney, Monsignor Hart and other prelates and priests appreciate the service Mrs. Ganster has rendered to the Church, the Chaplain said.

The Knights paused in prayer for the repose of the soul of their Auxiliary's supreme leader.

The Committee states our country is in urgent need of rubber and this is born out by President Roosevelt's statement on Tuesday. All kinds of rubber are wanted. As an example, auto tires, baby carriage tires, bicycle tires, lawn mower tires, auto tubes, tire patches,

articles, bathing caps, boots, heels, hoses, hot water bottles, industrial scrap rubber, jar rings, matting, coils, raincoats — anything made of rubber.

Citizens are asked to pile their collection of rubber articles at the curb (not in the street) in front of the homes, store or apartment on Saturday morning, June 20. City trucks and employees will pick up the donations. The rubber will be sold to war industries and the money raised given to the City of Rochester for use in the war effort.


