Dr. Cowen Marks Fortieth Anniversary In Priesthood

AUBURN—Sunday, June 14 will mark the Fortieth Anniversary of the ordination to the Holy Priesthood of the Rev. Dr. William E. Cowen, pastor of St. Mary's Church.

The day will commemorate for him forty years of thrilling experience, of monotonous details, forty years of accomplishments and zealous labor on behalf of seminarians of the Diocese of Rochester and of the parishioners of St. Mary's Church, Auburn.

In Doctor Cowen's class of 1902 at St. Bernard's Seminary marking also their fortieth anniversaries are the Rev. Louis W. Edelman, Pittsford; the Rev. Bernard J. Gaffell, East Rochester; the Rev. Joseph H. Gaffell, Nazareth College chaplain; and the Rev. Michael J. Krige, Brockport.

It is a rare thing indeed, to have a priest return as pastor to the church where he was baptized, received his first Holy Communion and sang his first Mass. High Mass, Dr. Cowen was born in Auburn, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Cowen. He was graduated from St. Mary's School and then entered St. Bernard's Seminary. In each of those schools he was distinguished for his brilliancy and was chosen by the faculty of St. Bernard's to try for the degree of doctor of theology which he received before the age of twenty-eight.

For nearly thirty years he was a member of the faculty of St. Bernard's Seminary where he was Professor of Fundamental Dogmatic Theology, Dogmatic Theology, English Literature and Ethics. There is scarcely a priest in the Diocese of Rochester who is not acquainted with Dr. Cowen for the majority of them recall him as their former professor. The four priests of the diocese, the Rt. Rev. Monsignor William F. Bergan, Rev. Henry Doerbecker, Rev. George Kalb, Rev. Francis Luddy, who this week celebrate the Silver Jubilee of their ordination to the priesthood were once students of his and Monsignor Bergan, like Dr. Cowen, is a native of Auburn, a graduate of St. Mary's Parochial School and the Auburn High School. Dr. Cowen is also a past chaplain of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus and is highly esteemed by the Rochester Knights with whom he came in contact.

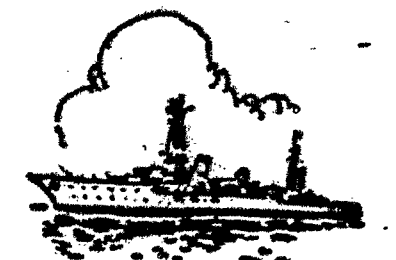
TEN YEARS AS PASTOR It is just ten years ago that Dr. Cowen was appointed pastor of St. Mary's and during those years he has labored diligently for his parishioners and given of his time and effort on behalf of all civic movements in the city of Auburn. He has never failed to respond to any cause sponsored by his par-

ishioners, has fought for and gained recognition for Catholicism in Auburn, has lent the prestige of his name to all causes for humanity and has been actively engaged in promoting parochial and civic affairs in Auburn during the past decade of his priesthood.

Next Sunday, the Fortieth Anniversary of his ordination, will be just like any other day to Dr. Cowen. The only change in his Sunday program will be that he will celebrate the children's Mass at 8:30 for the children of St. Mary's School are receiving Holy Communion at that Mass for his intention.

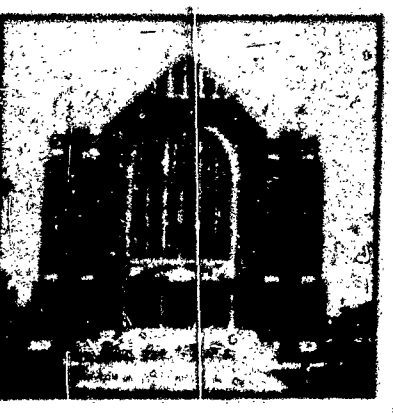

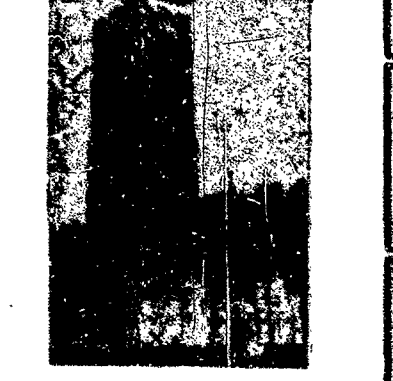
