St. Bonaventure College Activities

ST. BONAVENTURE — St. Bonaventure College is preparing for the opening of its summer session on July 7 which will mark the inauguration of its "around-the-calendar" operation in accordance with the accelerated study program arranged at the request of government authorities as a wartime measure.

For the first time, high school graduates may enroll in the summer session to start their college careers with the opportunity offered of completing their academic courses in three years. Students who wish to sign-up under the Navy V-1 and V-2 programs, the Army Enlisted Reserve plan, the Air Force Reserve, and the Marine Reserve corps, may begin their preparation for officers' commissions. Enrollment under these plans, will, in most cases, insure completion of the college courses, as well as exemption from selective service.

Registration for the summer session which will close on August 15th, is now in progress in the Office of Studies in DeLaRoche Hall. In addition to entering freshmen, men and women may enroll for graduate work.

The complete curriculum to be offered in the summer session program includes a full variety of subjects under the following departmental subdivisions:

Arts and Letters: English, Modern Languages, ancient languages, fine arts, including free-hand drawing, oil painting, etc.

Philosophy and Related Sciences: Philosophy, Ethics, Psychology, History, Social Sciences, Economics, Political Science, Education.

Natural Sciences and Mathematics: Biology, Histology, Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics.

ST. BONAVENTURE — The number of St. Bonaventure College faculty members to be assigned as U. S. Army Chaplains will reach five next week with the departure of the Rev. Aubert (Joseph) Conlon, O. F. M., Dean of Discipline, and the Rev. Colman (Francis) Dunne, O. F. M., faculty director of athletics, for Camp Rucker, Ala., for initial training.

Both have been commissioned as First Lieutenants in the U. S. Army Chaplains' Corps and are scheduled to start active service on June 14.
