

Cardinal Seen Stronger Than Hitler

WINESBOR, Ont. — "Oppression and persecution invariably produce heroes in the Christian religion, and the latest one is His Eminence Michael Cardinal Fahey, Archbishop of Montreal," says the Windsor Star, local daily secular newspaper. The editorial continues:

"His daring indictment of the Nazi regime, from his pulpit, has filled the world with admiration. It is another demonstration that the high principles of the true Christian can never become subservient to human evil, no matter how strongly armed.

"There is, however, a further significance in this incident. Thus far, the Cardinal has escaped Nazi retaliation. In fact there is no

word of any action being taken against him. It is another sign that Hitler is seriously doubtful of his former course of warfare against the Christian religion, and that he is seeking means of conciliation. It is a virtual admission on his part that he has met a force stronger than himself."

RECREATION HEAD SPEAKS

ITHACA — Edgar E. Bredhanner, director of recreation in the Ithaca Public Schools, was guest speaker at the final meeting of the Immaculate Conception PTA which was held on Tuesday, June 2.

Introduced by Mrs. John Geherin, president of the organization, Mr. Bredhanner outlined the summer recreation program planned for the Ithaca children. He explained that ten trained leaders have been assigned to lead the programs which begins on Monday, June 29. Five of the leaders, he declared, will carry on a separate and special program for about 600 children from all over the city. Approximately 120 of these children will be from the parochial school. They will be handled in relays. Mr. Bredhanner pointed out, and will learn crafts, nature study, swimming, first aid and various other subjects.

The Girls' Recreation Field will be used for the campsite, the Bird Sanctuary for a laboratory and Stewart Park for swimming. A trained nurse, he continued, will be on duty at all times to teach first aid and general safety rules. Interested persons in the city will give short talks to the children at intervals during the program.
