Uruguay Wage Law Inspired By Labor Encyclicals

MONTREVIDEO, Uruguay.—The draft of the Wage Law submitted to Congress by the Executive Office crystallizes the prolonged efforts of Uruguayan Catholics in behalf of social legislation inspired by the Labor Encyclicals of Popes Leo XII and Pius XI.

The bill provides for minimum wages in different categories, committees of arbitration and conciliation, and compensation funds for the payment of family allocation by private industry.

Recalls Dr. Cowen's First Solemn Mass In 1902

(From the files of the Auburn Citizen-Advertiser came the following account of the First Solemn Mass celebrated in St. Mary's Church, Auburn, by the Rev. Dr. William E. Cowen, now pastor, of that church who is this year marking his 40th sacerdotal anniversary).

JUNE 25, 1902

Yesterday was a day of much moment in St. Mary's Church when the Rev. William E. Cowen was the celebrant of his first solemn high Mass. Rev. William Mulheron, the pastor was assistant priest, Rev. James J. Gibbons of Horseheads, formerly assistant pastor of the church was deacon and Rev. Alexander J. McCabe of Rochester another graduate of the parish was sub-deacon. Students from St. Bernard's were acolytes and assistants. The altar which was beautifully decorated with lilies and smilax was ablaze with light. Father Cowen intoned the Mass in a clear, musical voice and the service was unusually impressive. The large choir under the direction of Prof. W. J. Dautak was assisted by an orchestra. Prof. A. Carrier presided at the organ.illard's Mass in G, was given in its entirety and the choir sang it well. The most difficult solos the "Qui Tollis" and "Agnus Dei" and the "Et incarnatus Est" was capably sung by Mrs. Charles H. Stafford and Miss May Hennessy respectively while among the male voices the solo parts were well cared for by William J. White, M. J. Slattery and Frank L. Brannick. The singing by the entire choir without accompaniment of Council's "Ave Verum" as an offertory showed careful training and was a feature of the service. "Sacred Heart of Jesus" was sung by the altar boys' choir and a chorus of grand volume was obtained when the altar boys and the choir proper joined in the rendition of "Holy God We Praise Thy Name" as the recessional. Rev. John F. O'Hern, the assistant pastor made the announcements and read the epistle and the gospel of the day, and the happily introduced Rev. Owen McGuire, D.D. of St. Bernard's Seminary Rochester who is no stranger to St. Mary's congregation. Dr. McGuire preached a sermon filled with able thought. The day was one of joy to Father Owen, to St. Mary's parish, to the priesthood, to the Sisters of St. Joseph and to the parents of the young priest, and the preacher described these joys in masterly English. He paid high tribute to Father Cowen's ability and his fitness and said that what those who knew him here at home had found him to be, he (Dr. McGuire) had found him to be at all times during the past few years in Rochester.

At the conclusion of the Mass Father Cowen conferred his blessing upon the congregation.

Luncheon was served at Father Mulheron's and the faithful altar boys were not forgotten in the good things of the day.

At 4:30 Father Cowen was celebrant of vespers which was attended by a large congregation. The choir sang the customary chant. After vespers Father Cowen entertained the clergy and his immediate relatives at dinner at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Cowen in York Street.

To make the day especially notable 25 candidates were received into the Holy Name Society in the afternoon. Dr. McGuire delivered a scholarly address to the new and old members.

Father Cowen who was prefect of his class and thus won the honor of saying his first mass in the Cathedral at Rochester will also at the request of Bishop McQuaid return to St. Bernard's to prepare himself for the degree of Doctor of Divinity.
