PASTOR'S SILVER JUBILEE

The entire parish will join with Monsignor Bergan this week in marking the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination. The school children will attend Mass for their pastor on Friday morning, June 12 at 9 o'clock. Immediately following the triduum services on Friday evening, a brief entertainment and reception will be held in the parish hall, beginning at 8:30 o'clock.

The Most Rev. James E. Kearney will preside at the Solemn High Mass, coram Episcopo, on Sunday, June 14, at 11 o'clock, and will deliver the sermon on this occasion. In the three short years that Msgr. Bergan has been pastor of St. Monica's, he has won the love and admiration of the entire parish. And on this very happy occasion, he, his people—from the tiniest tot in kindergarten to those

of us whose school days are long since past—join in wishing him the very happiest of anniversaries. May the Patroness of our church, through the intercession of the Blessed Mother and her Divine Son, continue to bless his work for many, many years to come.

Triduum services in honor of the Sacred Heart of Jesus were held this week at 7:45 o'clock on Wednesday and Thursday evenings. They will close on Friday evening and the entire parish is urged to attend this service.

Graduation exercises will be held in St. Monica's Church on Thursday evening, June 18. Seventy-four boys and girls will receive their diplomas at this time.

The date of graduation was changed from Friday to Thursday so that the graduates, as well as their families and friends, could participate in Rochester's War Week Victory Parade.

Hospital Unit To Get Flag

A special flag, together with a silk American flag, will be formally presented to the 19th General Hospital unit, at a public ceremony Sunday afternoon June 14, the opening day of War Week, at 3 P. M., in Cobb's Hill Park (opposite the Culver Road Armory). Participating will be the 3rd Battalion of the 21st Regiment, New York Guard. The parade will be led by the 21st Regiment Band. Richard J. Toole of WHAM staff will be master of ceremonies. The program will be broadcast over a public address system and transcribed for a later WHAM broadcast. The special flag measures slightly more than 4 by 5 feet and has a maroon background (the medical colors) and gold fringe. The bald eagle from the Great Seal of the

United States is the central design. In its beak is a scroll bearing the motto Humanitas Minus (I Serve Humanity); and on the shield, in front of the eagle's body, is the staff and sacred snake of Aesculapius, the Greek God of Medicine. In one corner of the shield is the red poppy from which Morphine is derived and in the other corner is the purple foxglove from which digitalis is extracted. These are two of the most important drugs used by the medical profession. Above the eagle's head is the seal of the Rochester General Hospital and below the eagle is a large scroll bearing the caption "19th General Hospital." A fund to cover the cost of the flag and other items amounting to \$500 is being raised within the Rochester General Hospital organization.

Register For War Industry Training

Registrations for the war industries summer training program for men and women will be accepted starting Monday, June 15, from 7:00 p. m. to 10:00 p. m. at the VENT Office of the Board of Education located at 13 South Fitzhugh Street in Rochester. Earne A. Bird, Assistant Superintendent of Schools and VENT Director, stated that a concerted drive will be made to get women to train for war jobs. He said "Starting July 1, war plants in this area will be able to place thousands of trained workers." "Speaking for the city of Rochester, women training for war industry jobs are beginning to get on the payroll in war plants in greater numbers than men," Mr. Bird said. Disclosing that in two years the Rochester war industries training program has trained men and women surpassing the \$5,000 mark. This included training in refresher and upgrading classes. In the past four week period, 128 women were placed here in war jobs compared to 115 men. "This," Mr. Bird declared, "is an indication that women will play an increasing part in making up the personnel of war plants in the stepped-up battle for production.
