present General Secretary, assisted John L. Keenan in organizing a campaign resulting in \$77,000.

In 1918 the people of Rochester, despite the pressure of war, organized the Community Chest whose history is an outstanding example of the neighborly spirit of Rochester. The Rochester Catholic Charities, in proud of its association with the Chest and through it expresses gratitude to the people of Rochester, leaders stated this week.

Doing a little children's work from the beginning, Rochester Catholic Charities from 1917 to 1922 devoted its efforts almost exclusively to maintenance of families whose revenue was inadequate. Father Staub resigned in 1919. His fine work was ably continued by Father John B. Crowley who headed Catholic Charities until he was appointed pastor in 1924. Children's Work Begins

In 1922 the Charities branched out formally into the children's field. Since its inception the department has cared for about 600 children a year on the average. Over 250 children have been adopted through the Children's Department since 1927.

Miss Kathleen d'Olier began, in 1924, a career in Catholic social work which has been one of the most successful in that field in this country. Under her direction the agency expanded into other fields. Care of unwed mothers and their children became an integral part of the agency. This service has helped over 1,200 mothers. In this field Catholic Charities pioneered the development of foster homes for the care of mother and child.

The Charities has carried on at various times, a Clothing Department, temporary home for infants, a clinic for mothers, a service for single men and paroled work.

Since 1928 all Catholic immigrants desiring to settle in the Diocese of Rochester have been interviewed at the Charities office. At the beginning of a difficult time in its history in 1930, His Excellency, Bishop O'Hara, named the Rev. Walter A. Foery as the Charities' third priest-director. His kindly and steadfast spirit proved a bulwark during the dark days of depression, the Charities leaders recall. At that time the service of the Catholic Charities staff was put at the disposal of the city Bureau of Public Welfare. Almost 5,000 applicants for help were made at the Catholic Charities offices during 1932 which relieved the strain on the tax-supported department.

When Bishop Foery was elevated to the Bishopric in 1937, the Rev. Gerald C. Lambert was named to direct the Rochester Catholic Charities. Father Lambert is assisted by the Rev. Joseph E. Vogt, director of the Social Action Division. The Social Action Division includes the Charles Settlement House, the Genesee Institute, Columbus Youth Association, Camp Stella Maria, Diocesan Committee of Boy and Girl Scouts and the Catholic Youth Association. The Rev. Arthur E. Ratigan, M.B.S.W., is Director of the Family and Children's Division. This Division includes the work of the Bureau of Catholic Charities at 39 State Street, as well as the supervision of St. Ann's Home for the Aged, St. Elizabeth's Guild House and the new St. Joseph's Villa.

The Rochester Catholic Charities is taking the occasion of the Anniversary to pay tribute to the Sisters' charitable work in the diocese. The Sisters were the first to care for the Catholic dependent child, the aged and sick. Tribute is also being paid to the other charitable agencies in the city from whom the Rochester Catholic Charities has received grateful help and willing cooperation.

CANADIAN MARTYRS SHRINE REOPENED FOR SUMMER

MIDLAND, Ont. The Canadian Martyrs' shrine here has reopened for the summer, and archaeology excavations have been resumed in the nearby Old Fort Ste Marie, burial place of the Jesuit martyrs, St. Jean Brebeuf and St. Gabriel Lalemant.

Last summer the Royal Ontario Museum bore part of the heavy expenses involved in the excavation work by furnishing four archaeologists, while the shrine gave them accommodations and furnished six laborers to dig. The archaeologists hope to have their work done in September.

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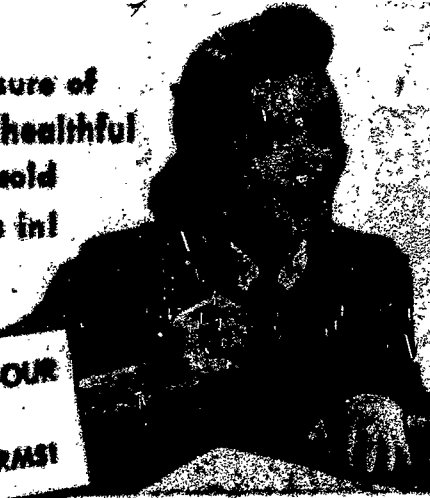
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
