

### Msgr. Griffin Marks 60th Anniversary in Holy Priesthood

CORNING—A High Mass will be celebrated at 8:50 a. m. Sunday, June 21, at St. Mary's Church in honor of the Rt. Rev. James J. Griffin, pastor emeritus of St. Mary's, who will commemorate on that day the 60th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood.

The Rev. Lewis Edelman of Pittsford will preach the sermon and the congregation will receive Holy Communion at this Mass.

Monsignor Griffin was ordained June 21, 1882, and is the oldest priest in point of ordination in Western New York. He prepared for the priesthood at St. Bonaventure's College and St. Bonaventure's Seminary.

In 1895 Msgr. Griffin was appointed to St. Mary's Church at East where he served until he was transferred to St. James' Church at Waverly. Coming to Corning over 20 years ago as pastor of St. Mary's he remained in that capacity until May 1940 when he was named pastor emeritus and the Rev. John A. Smith took over his duties as pastor.

### British Warfare Head Is Convert

LONDON—The Director General of Political Warfare here and one of his three assistants are Catholics; it is known now that the names of these officials have been revealed in the House of Commons.

R. H. Bruce Lockhart, who is the Director General, was a convert in 1923. He was acting Consul-General in Moscow from 1913 to 1917, unofficial British representative after the revolution and head of the special British mission to the Bolshevik government in 1918.

One of his assistants is Ivone Kirkpatrick, former charge d'affaires at the British Legation in the Holy See. He was at the Brit-

ish Embassy at Berlin during the crisis days before the war and is acted as interpreter for British Chamberlains in the talks with Hitler at Goodenough. When the war broke out he was in London and he was raised with to identify him and to interrogate him on behalf of the government.
