Center To Correct Children's Eye Defects Opened By Health Groups

Children suffering from squint or cross-eye in the City and County will now have the opportunity to benefit from instruction at the Rochester Orthoptic Center which was opened June 14 in Public School No. 31, at 208 North Goodman Street.

The Center is open to all persons in need of eye muscle training whose applications are approved by the attending physician. Instruction hours are: Monday, Wednesday and Friday—12:30 P. M. to 4:30 P. M., and Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday—10:00 A. M. to 2:00 P. M. Now applicants are interviewed on Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning. The Center is being conducted on an appointment basis allowing approximately one-half hour for each individual.

The organizations and institutions participating in the project include the State Department of Social Welfare—Commission for the Blind, the Eye Conservation Committee of the Tuberculosis and Health Association, Medical Society of the County of Monroe, the Rochester Board of Education, the Rochester Health Bureau, the Rochester Alumnae Chapter of the Delta Gamma Fraternity, the Rochester Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Club, the Rochester Guild of Prescription Opticians, the Rochester Optometric Society, the Rochester Visiting Nurse Association, the Rochester Association for the Blind, and the manufacturers of orthoptic instruments.

The Center is in charge of Dorothy Masch, orthoptic technician of the State Department of Social Welfare. Dr. Leonard W. Jones heads the committee on medical

and technical service in charge of center service. Dr. Frank Barber is the attending physician. Harry E. Crowley heads the Eye Conservation Committee which is responsible for the orthoptic training service, an activity sponsored by the Tuberculosis and Health Association of which Joseph P. MacSweeney is president.
