war and for the greater unity of the people both now and in the post war world.

We ask this in the spirit of the Encyclicals and addresses of the Popes and of the pastoral letters, programs, and statements of our own Bishops. We ask it for the sake of justice and for the unity of the people in Christ.

Women in Industry

Women are being called to serve in the factories that create the means of winning this crucial war. Drawing more women into industry should be delayed until the men of the country are employed.

The standards protecting working women through law and organization must be enforced and protected.

Wives and mothers should be called on last of all. Good family life requires that. The governmental program to use the working force of the country to the utmost must put wives and mothers in a preferred group. We ask that the government, employers, employers' organizations, and labor unions use their influence and power against the further employment of wives and mothers in industry.

In spite of wartime handicaps, gas rationing and all the others, the interest shown and the number planning to attend has justified the holding of the Institute on Industry June 22-27 at the National Catholic School of Social Service, 2400 19th Street, Washington, D. C. A nominal fee of \$25.00 covers board, tuition, and a special course of evening lectures.

The Institute will comprise two Divisions:

- I. Working Girls
- II. Leaders in Industrial Problems

Camp Stella Maris Gets 10 More Acres

Ten acres of land have been acquired by Camp Stella Maris, diocesan camp on Conesus Lake, it was announced today. The land extends across the back of the present campus and was part of the original estate. The acquisition of this property marks the fulfilled dream of Camp Stella Maris to occupy the entire former estate of twenty-five acres.

The new property contains several buildings which will be remodeled to fulfill camp needs. Caretakers of the camp will be housed in the cottages on the grounds. Part of the new section will be used to enlarge the present half diamond behind the camp administration buildings. The grounds will be cultivated so that eventually fresh vegetables for the table can be grown on the grounds.

Camp Stella Maris will open its season on June 21, and already this two-week encampment for the boys has been filled. Following the boys' camping periods, Stella Maris will be open to girls for four weeks of camp.

Quinine, \$1 A Pill Adds To Problems of South China Mission

MARYKNOLL, (NC)—Quinine at \$1 a pill is the peakpoint in Bishop Francis E. Ford's current medical bill for the Maryknoll mission at Kaying, South China.

"Medicines now are sky-high," writes the Bishop. "One bill for medicine recently was \$1,000 National. Ordinarily, medicine would not be such a factor, but the four years of war and the closing of the ports have gradually drained China of its medical supplies and replacements are lacking. Quinine sells for \$1 a pill."

There are now 122 Maryknoll priests, Brothers and Sisters in South China engaged in mission work.


