K. of C. Name Statt To Compile War Data

Appointed by Chairman John E. Swift of the War Activities Committee of the Supreme Council, Knights of Columbus, Cyril J. Statt, Master, Fifth District, Fourth Degree has charge of compiling a complete and permanent record of the Council and individual member's contributions to the war effort.

Mr. Statt has been assigned to cover the area covered by the Rochester diocesan area in Region No. 2 headed by Supreme Secretary Joseph F. Lamb.

Information Wanted
Information will be sought from the individual councils on the names of members of each Council in the service, branch of service, officer's rank, if any, military honors and deaths occurring in the service.

Each Council will prepare an Honor Roll.
Council contributions such as use of Council rooms for military or defense meetings; entertainment programs sponsored for men in the service; what Council is doing for its own members; and Council's financial contributions to War Bond Program, U.S.O., Civilian Defense and the Red Cross will be information sought by Mr. Statt.

Added information on Councils sponsoring Blood Donors, attending First Aid Courses and furnishing religious articles, gift packages and other articles to service men is wanted. Data on activities sponsored by the Council for men in the service in cooperation with other organizations such as the N. C. S. Civilian Reception Committee and other groups will be compiled.

A record will be made of individual membership's contributions to the War Bond Program and a record of outstanding members in the Civilian Protection Program will be compiled.

Any data helpful to Chairman Cyril J. Statt can be sent to him at 48 Mt. Hope Ave., Rochester or he will answer any questions concerning the compiling of data on the Knights of Columbus activities in the war effort.

Thus did His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, conclude his sermon at the Silver Jubilee Mass of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William F. Bergan which was celebrated by the Jubilarian in St. Monica's Church on Sunday, June 14, at 11 o'clock.

In reviewing Monsignor Bergan's twenty-five years of serving the people of the diocese in the capacity of teacher, "friend of sinners," chancellor and pastor, Bishop Kearney also declared that "the diocese is richer and will be richer for his years of administration."

With His Excellency, Bishop Kearney presiding at the throne, the officers of the Mass with Monsignor Bergan, were: Assistant Priest, Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, V.G. Deacons of Honor, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. F. Goggin and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles P. Shay; Deacon, the Rev. Frederick G. Straub, pastor of St. Alphonsus Church, Auburn; Subdeacon, the Rev. Daniel E. O'Rourke, pastor of Our Mother of Sorrows Church.

The Most Rev. Walter A. Foery, Bishop of Syracuse and close friend of Msgr. Bergan's was also present in the sanctuary, together with several other monsignori and priests. The Rev. Dr. James McAniff, vice-chancellor was master of ceremonies.

Monsignor Bergan was escorted to the altar by a procession of school children, altar boys, seminarians and clergy. The church was crowded with parishioners and friends of the jubilarian who joined with him in his Mass of Thanksgiving.

Following the Mass a dinner was held at the Palm Room of the Hotel Seneca. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron, the "good neighbor" pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, was toastmaster, and Bishop Foery, Bishop Kearney and Monsignor Hart were among those who briefly addressed the assembled clergy, friends and relatives of the jubilarian.

Also guests of Monsignor Bergan on this happy occasion were about fifty nuns of the different orders, who, after attending the Solemn High Mass adjourned to the parish hall where dinner was served for them.

Last Friday evening in the hall an entertainment and reception was held by the people of St. Monica's for their pastor. The program included choral selections by the Eighth Grade pupils, and the Sodality Glee Club, and a very entertaining operetta by "Our Little Ones." Charles A. Kick of the Seventh Grade delivered the "Greeting," and Father Bernard Cleary made the presentation. The school children, the parishioners and the various church organizations presented gifts which were displayed in the front of the hall.

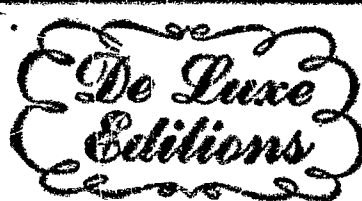

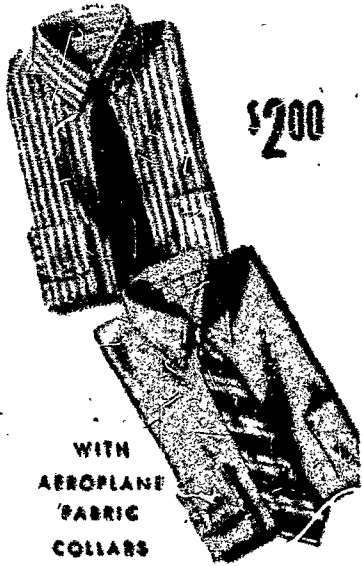
