Describes 'Catholic Miss America of 1942'

Miss Mary E. FitzGerald, Executive Director of the Elmira Catholic Charities was the speaker at the Communion Breakfast of the Junior Catholic Daughters of Binghamton. About 120 attended this annual event which was held at the Arlington Hotel on Sunday, June 14 at 10 o'clock.

The Binghamton organization is a city wide group and takes an active part in religious, civic and national affairs. They are members of the Council of Social Agencies and of the Catholic Council of Broome County.

Miss FitzGerald's subject was "Catholic Miss America of 1942." She said in part—"I thought that the subject, Junior Catholic Miss America 1942, sounded quite intriguing but the more I considered it the more perplexing it became. You young women of today are so wise in your own rights, so confident as you gaze into the future."

"I still believe however that I may be able to contribute a little to your thinking. Every year in early September, the papers particularly around New York City paint the beauties of the candidates for the title Miss America in the Atlantic City Contest. Pages of description and columns of pictures but never a word about the morals of the young lady or a hint that she has a beautiful soul."

"And what of our Junior Catholic Miss America 1942? I think that you, Miss America should also have clear bright eyes, in which the reflection of an inner beauty shines. You can be just as attractive and as well dressed as any of your companions—yes—and more so, because you have the background of your moral principles."

"I like to think of each one of you gaily dancing through the days enjoying all of the happy healthful pursuits of 1942. And as your laughter echoes back and brightens the lives of those with whom you come in contact I would remember you as picking a bouquet of flowers to lay at our Lady's feet asking her to fold them and all your intentions in her sweet hands and lay them close to the Sacred Heart of her Divine Son."

"Can you think of yourselves as going about enjoying your parties, movies, dates and dances and yet taking time to gather flowers for such a garland. You could never convince me that such a course would detract in the least from your popularity. I challenge you who would qualify for Junior Catholic Miss America 1942 to try it and see."

"The first prerequisite of a Junior Catholic Miss America 1942 is that she keep the second soul, she received in the Sacrament of Baptism in the state of sanctifying grace. Then with all the charm of her youth and beauty our Junior Catholic Miss America 1942 could walk up to our Blessed Saviour if He were to come into this dining room now and put her hand under His arm because she is a member of His Divine Family."

"You have already gone far toward the goal of Miss America 1942 according to our Catholic standards. The path to that achievement is not too stony or rough. It is studded with the sun of the love of the dear Sacred Heart to whom you are dedicated. It echoes with the gay laughter of happy souls, it is crowded with friends who keep within the laws of God and man, it is carpeted with beautiful flowers, planted there through the practice of virtues pleasing to the Sacred Heart of our Divine Saviour and the Immaculate heart of His dear Mother."

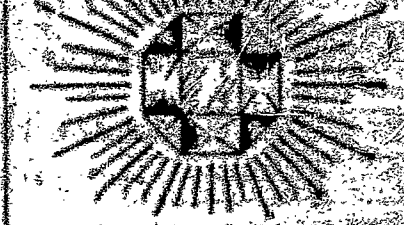
