

81 Pupils Will Be Graduated From Three Corning Schools

CORNING— Graduation exercises for the three parochial schools will mark the coming weekend. The 26 pupils of the Eighth Grade at St. Mary's School will receive their diplomas Friday evening at 7:30 in the School Hall. The Rev. Charles Mahoney, Ph.D., associate superintendent of the parochial school system of the Rochester Diocese, will address the graduates.

The patriotic play which was presented last week by the students of the lower grades will be repeated under the direction of Sister M. Helene.

A class of 23 will be graduated on the same evening at St. Vincent de Paul's Church. The Rev. John C. Newcomb, assistant pastor of St. Mary's, will be the speaker.

The following program has been arranged: After marching into the Church and taking their seats the graduates will sing Rossini's "Heart of Jesus, My Shepherd, My Friend"; Joseph Dailey, representing the class will then read the Act of Consecration to the Sacred Heart; in conclusion Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will be given with the class singing the hymns, "Aderamus Te" and "Tantum Ergo." The "Te Deum" will be sung as the recessional.

Lauds Probation Work Aid

DUBLIN— The work of the Most Rev. John McQuinn, Archbishop of Dublin, in connection with the treatment of juvenile delinquents was praised by Minister for Justice Boland in the Dail Eireann when moving the vote for

The plan just inaugurated in Dublin, whereby voluntary workers assist probation officers in juvenile cases, would have gone far without Archbishop McQuinn's assistance, Mr. Boland said. The bill he declared, would be the Arch-bishop's gift of gratitude for the help he has given not only in this but in every aspect of the treatment of juvenile delinquency. Among Archbishop McQuinn's other contributions Mr. Boland cited his activity in providing evening classes for youths on probation.

Nazi Journal Holds Priest Who Says Prayers For Dead Is 'Non-Cooperative'

NEW YORK— Some idea of the weird workings of the Nazi mind is given in an article in an appropriately named anti-clerical publication circulated in Occupied Holland, De Nieuwsteer (The Foghorn). The Netherlands News Agency here quotes De Nieuwsteer as saying: "The non-cooperative attitude of the clergy becomes increasingly more open."

To illustrate, De Nieuwsteer cited the case of a priest who had prayed for the repose of the soul of a colleague who had died while imprisoned by the Germans. "This is not the first time Father... has prayed for a priest who died in captivity," said De Nieuwsteer. "He did the same at the request of relatives of a priest from the Hague."

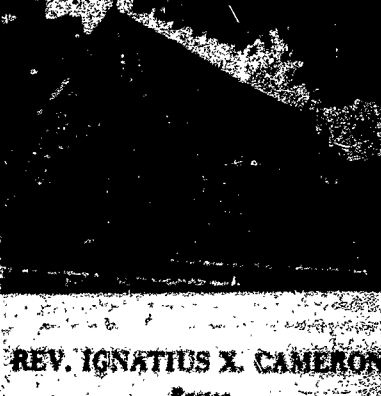

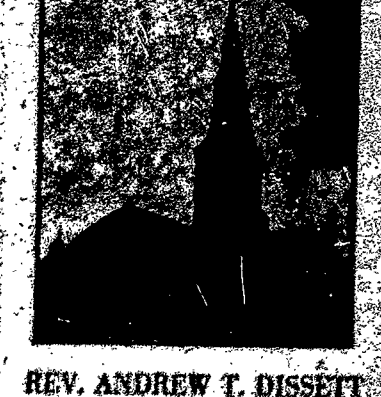
