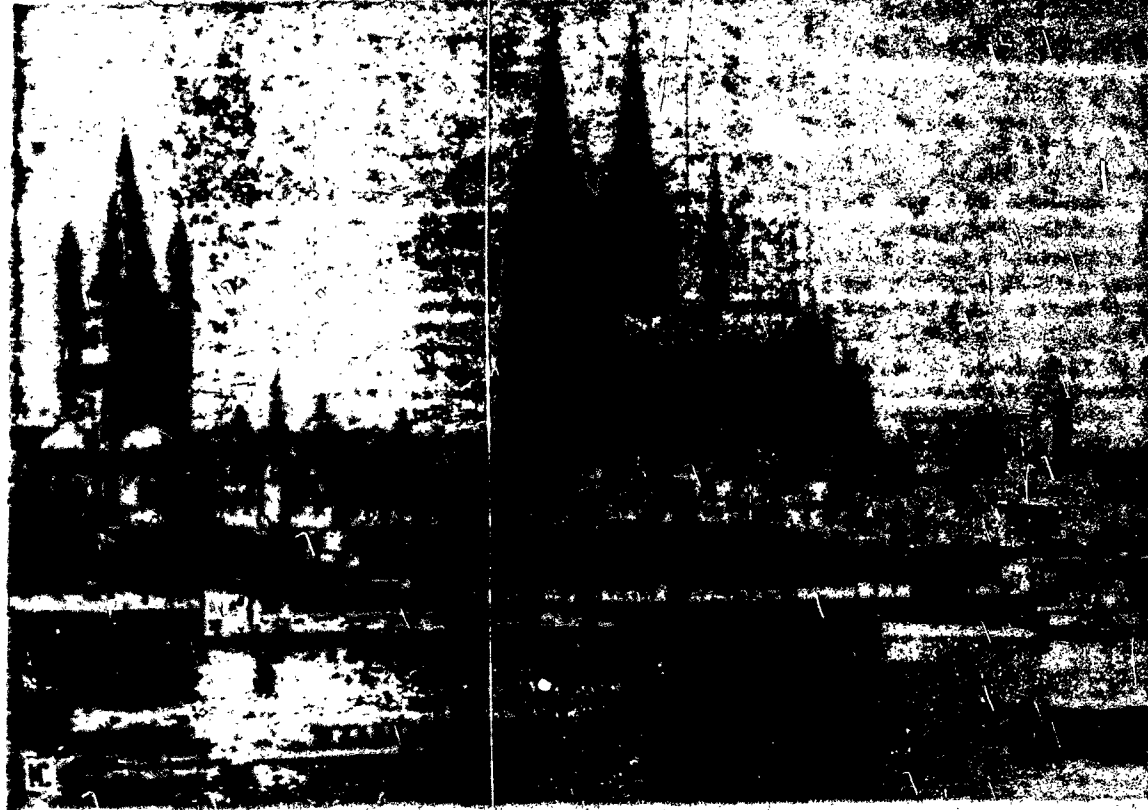


CATHEDRAL IN PATH OF AIR BLITZ

CARDINAL OPHELDS POLAND IN NATIONAL DAY MESSAGE

LONDON.—(AP)—"I regard the unquestionable truth that Poland is the test of justice and of the sincerity of British, American and Allied war aims," declared His Eminence Arthur Cardinal Hinsley, Archbishop of Westminster, in a message he wrote for broadcast to Poland on Poland's national day.

"The Nazis aim is to destroy the splendid cultural tradition of Poland and to exterminate its people," he said. "All the material horrors of the invaders are forced from Poland and there cannot be peace nor any hope for justice and liberty in Europe."

"The very soul of liberty is smothered in Poland and we stand with Poland's soul in defense of the life of the spirit."

Poland's President, Marshal Jozef Pilsudski, General Edward Przemyslanski and Commander-in-Chief, General Bronislaw Gdonski, were also mentioned in the message.

"It is Christ's will that we should recognize the dignity of His own very self in the respect of man." — Plus XII.
