This Institute will bring together the Catholic Women's Organizations in our deaneries and the Director of Catholic Charities in the interest of the charities program for volunteer aid.

It is a tremendous opportunity for our Council to pioneer in this movement.

After much consideration of the problems involved, by Monsignor O'Grady, National Director of Catholic Charities, Father Lambert, our National Office, and our Diocesan Executive Committee, N.C.C.W. the Institute has been planned for the week of July 13, with meetings in four deaneries:

July 13—in Geneva.

July 14—in Rochester.

July 15—a day in Rochester comparing notes, etc.

July 16—in Auburn (including the Ithaca District).

July 17—in Elmira (including Canning Deanery affiliations).

All women engaged in volunteer service of any type, for Church or parochial organizations, are invited to attend the Institute. Presentation and discussion will be based on "The Call to Service".

The combination of Elmira and Canning Deaneries and of the Auburn Deanery and the Ithaca District is with a view to a minimum of expense and time.

Monsignor O'Grady is planning to be with us. Miss Ruth Craven, Field Secretary of the N.C.C.W. and Mrs. Leo Kenny, National Chairman of the N.C.C.W. Committee on Cooperation with Catholic Charities, will both be with us to give key talks, leaving ample time for discussion by those attending the Institute.

The agenda for the meetings is now being discussed.

Family Wage Law Proposed In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES. Deputies Francisco Casella and Jaime E. Soler have introduced a bill which would make family allocations compulsory throughout Argentina.

If the bill becomes a law, heads of families employed by public services, banks, insurance companies, industrial and commercial concerns (including labor within the home), the liberal professions, benevolent associations, agriculture, cattle-raising, forestry and fishing, and other classes of employment, would receive an additional wage on the basis of the size of the family.
