Graduates Hear Bishop Stress Faith's Need In A World Crisis

That their Catholic training and Catholic faith inculcated during four years of high school life will be safeguards in a chaotic world was the message given by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, as he presented diplomas and awards to 546 graduates of the city's three high schools over the weekend.

Patriotism was the motif in the impressive graduation exercises with each of the three schools, noting in an especial manner, loyalty of faculty graduates and student body to the United States of America.

Advancing the graduation one night because of the mammoth War Week parade in Rochester, Our Lady of Mercy High School held the commencement exercises on Thursday, June 18, for the first time in the beautiful new auditorium on Blossom Road. The class, numbering 192 girls, received awards and diplomas from Bishop Kearney. At the 39th Annual Commencement of Aquinas Institute, 222 boys received their diplomas on Monday night, June 21. The Bishop also conferred 222 diplomas on the girls in the Seventieth Commencement class at Nazareth Academy, Monday night, June 22.

Our Lady of Mercy High School

That they keep ever strong the holy faith that is theirs and that they "preserve the spirit" of Our Lady of Mercy High School was the message given by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, to the 192 graduates of the Sisters of Mercy school of secondary education.

The Sacred Truth which they had learned in their four years at Mercy High School should be kept with them as they go out into a world in which that truth is so much under attack, the Bishop said. Their lives should be in accordance with that truth if they are to succeed, the graduates were told.

Presenting the class to His Excellency was the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey, vice chancellor and secretary to the Bishop Marian Hyland, who won numerous outstanding scholastic awards, was the class speaker. The class poem was read by Marie Hafner.

The patriotic theme "Pledge to God and Country," was carried out by one student holding the Papal Flag as she recited the Nicene Creed and another bearing the American Flag as she led in the Pledge of Allegiance. All joined in singing the National Anthem. The graduates chorus, music by the school orchestra directed by Mr. Joseph Pierce and Miss Monica Servas at the organ rounded out the program.

Aquinas Institute

The school motto, "Credo Quidquid Dixit Dei Filius," was held up for the 222 graduates of Aquinas Institute as "your credo" for life, by His Excellency in the Commencement address.

The Christian philosophy of life with all its counsel and guidance should be with these young men "no matter where destiny may take you," the Bishop said.

Presentation of the class was by the Rev. John H. O'Loane, C.S.B., principal of Aquinas Institute, who read off the special awards.

An honored guest at the graduation exercises was the Rt. Rev. Archbishop Alfred Koch, of the Benedictine Order, here for a young Benedictine Father's First Solemn Mass at Corpus Christi Church.

A striking American flag in red, white and blue flowers furnished a proper setting for singing of the national anthem. A double quartette of graduates sang a hymn to the Blessed Mother. John Culligan and Joseph Wilber were heard in piano duets. The Aquinas Symphonic Band, directed by Raymond J. Hasenauer, gave a pre-commencement musical.
