

Sacred Heart Academy Graduation Rites Held

The eighty-seventh annual distribution of prizes and certificates took place at the Academy of the Sacred Heart on Friday, June 12. His Excellency, Bishop James M. Kearney, celebrated the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass in the convalescent chapel at 9:30, and reminded the students of their privilege in being able to offer the results of the scholastic year in union with the Holy Sacrifice, on the Feast of the Sacred Heart.

At 10 o'clock, Commencement Exercises were held in the Auditorium, which was lavishly decorated with baskets of flowers. His Excellency presided, with a large number of the clergy in attendance. Four tiny tots of the First Elementary Class delivered a Salutatory in the form of an animated dialogue, after which the school rendered the Chorus "I Know a Bank," by Horn. "Honorary distinction" were then conferred, the Second Medallion and the accompanying prize for "Good Conduct" being awarded to Shirley Ann Simpson. Awards of Blue and Green Ribbons of Merit were made to students of the High School classes with Pink and Red Ribbons for winners in the grades.

In a little play entitled "A Burning and a Shining Light," a group of students presented four touching scenes from the life of Saint John Fisher, terminating in a beautiful tableau of "Our Lady of Light." The school then sang the Chorus "I Am the Light of the World," by Gaul. At the distribution of prizes and certificates, graduation diplomas were awarded to Joan Boland, Rose Mary Connor, Anne Lawless, Patricia Marston, Virginia Misar, Shirley Ann Simpson, and Anne Welch.

Prizes were awarded for outstanding work in each grade, in Christian Doctrine, English, Latin, French, Mathematics and Science, as also for perfect attendance. Among the special awards, the medal presented by the Alumnae Association for the best essay was awarded to Rose Mary Connor. The Walton Prize for the highest average in French was won by Mary Katherine Klee. The Faldin award for outstanding work for the missions was conferred upon Virginia Misar. The Valdictory, by Shirley Ann Simpson, developed the theme of the play, "Light Shining in Darkness."

After an eloquent address by His Excellency to the graduates, the students went in procession to the chapel where Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament was given to the school and to the guests of the graduates. After the Benediction His Excellency addressed a few words especially to the parents of the graduating class, congratulating and thanking them for having given their children the benefits of a Catholic education.

The Academy of the Sacred Heart includes a pre-school, to which little boys as well as girls are admitted, and all the grades through High School, for girls only. The High School curriculum includes two courses. The College Preparatory Course prepares the students for colleges of the highest standing throughout the country. The General Course allows a wider variety of subjects, according to the aptitudes of the students, and matriculates for many colleges of good standing. Students who wish to obtain a Regents Diploma take Regents Examinations. Registration may be made at any time during the summer, but it is best that application be made before July 1.


