ITHACA — With the vacation season now at hand, the sale of war stamps in the Ithaca public schools has ended with a total of 61,468 stamps sold.

As these stamps were of the 16-cent denomination, this sale represented \$9,836.00, which had been turned in by the school children in the 16 weeks of the campaign.

The highest individual school sale in any one week was made by the pupils of the Parochial School with 2,571 stamps to their credit, while the highest sale made in the elementary schools was credited to the Fall Creek School, with a figure of 1,417.

Following the sales reports very closely, it was noted that except for a couple of occasions, the Parochial School has led all of the Ithaca schools, including the Ithaca High School, in weekly stamp sales.
