"One evening when I went out to the woodpile to get chips I heard a choked voice coming from the smokehouse. It was Kenneth saying over and over, 'I wish I had pretty brown hair like Donald.' "I was ashamed and distressed. You may be sure I said no more about Donald's dark hair. Instead, I began to talk about Kenneth's brown eyes and his sturdy shoulders. Today, he's a handsome six-footer and brown hair -- yes, it turned, and he is as good as he is handsome. "It's strange, isn't it," Miss Sanders remarked thoughtfully, "that adults put so much emphasis on hair and eyes, or height, or the shape of children's noses? College Extension For Choirmasters Opened

NEW YORK The newly inaugurated Catholic Choirmasters Correspondence Course under the academic direction of St. Albertus College of Racine, Wisconsin, offers to the nation's thousands of organists and choirmasters an unprecedented opportunity to study all the branches of sacred music under accredited college supervision. This course will be a boon to those who have had no opportunity to attend college courses in sacred music. The course consists of 110 text lessons covering such subjects as Liturgy, Liturgical Aesthetics, Latin Pronunciation, Elementary Chant Theory, Rhythm, Chronometry, Modality, Psalmody, the Training of Children's and Boys' Chorus, Male Choir Training and Polyphony. A series of several albums of correlated recordings made by national groups correlates the theory of the text lessons. Among the internationally known faculty members are Rev. Gerald Ellard, S.J., Dom Stephen Thuis, O.S.B., Dr. H. Becket Gibbs, Dr. R. Mills Silby, Dom Ermin Vitry, O.S.B., Rev. Ethelbert Thibault, P.S.S., Rev. Joseph Kush, Dom Godfrey Diekmann, O.S.B., Clifford A. Bennett, Organist and Choirmaster of the Sacred Heart Church, Pittsburgh and Instructor of Chant and Polyphony at the Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh.
