Fr. Walter Fischer

Father Walter Fischer, for seven years an assistant pastor in St. Alphonsus Church, has been transferred to St. Ann's, Hornell. It was in June, 1935, that Father Fischer was ordained in St. Patrick's Cathedral by Archbishop Mooney and shortly after received his first assignment to St. Alphonsus.

From that time Father Fischer has been one of the most active priests in the City of Auburn. The spiritual care he gave to the people of the parish of all ages, his leadership in the various youth programs of the parish, his valuable assistance in the work of founding a parish camp, where he served as director during the camping season; are only a few of the many activities in which he took part during the past seven years.

In civic activities he became widely known for his outstanding leadership and untiring energy. His work in helping to organize the Civilian Defense program in Auburn will be long remembered. Father Fischer's transfer to Hornell is deeply regretted by the parishioners of St. Alphonsus. The parish owes much to him and their gratitude can only be expressed with prayers and best wishes for a most successful and blessed career of laboring for God and souls.
