A way to test the quality of coffee is to put a spoonful in a glass of cold water and add a few drops of lemon juice. If the coffee is pure it will remain on top of the water; if not, the water will become brown in color.

Getting On In The World

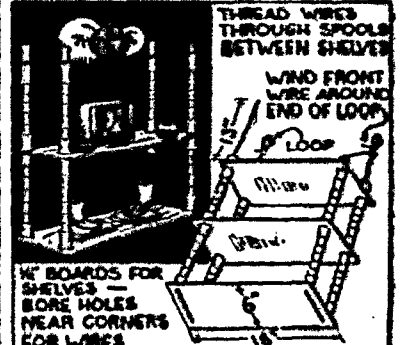

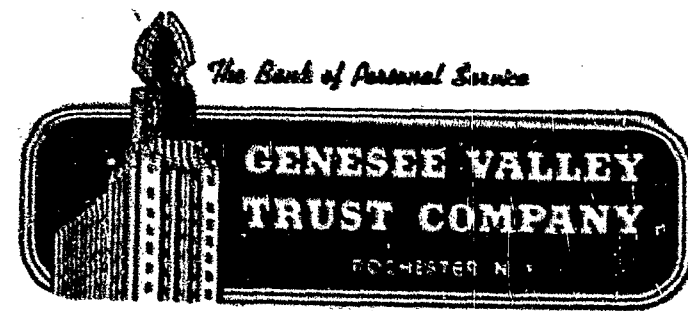
SAVE THOSE EMPTY SPOOLS

In the good old days when dress-makers were paid according to the number of spools of thread they used, the empty spools were saved until enough had been accumulated to make a corner what-not or hanging shelves. Now, with machines whirring for defense sewing, it is again easy to save enough spools for one of these quaint sets of shelves.

You will need sixty spools 12 1/2 feet of wire just stiff enough to bend easily; and three boards of the size desired for the shelves. Either a stain or a paint finish may be used.
