Boyce Funeral Directing Firm Third Generation

Lillian R. Boyce, with her husband, Lewis J. Boyce, is the third generation to serve Rochester in the funeral directing business. Fifty-eight years ago, in 1884, her grandfather, William Rosenbach, opened his undertaking establishment at 24 Allen St. and was one of five funeral directors in Rochester at that time. Upon his death in 1900, Mr. Boyce's father, Frank W. Rosenbach, and another brother William H. Rosenbach, both of whom had been associated with their father in business prior to his death, continued to carry on under the name of William Rosenbach's Sons.

In 1911 Mrs. Boyce's father dissolved partnership with his brother and set up his own Funeral Home at 131 Allen St., where, with his wife, Lillian Kohler Rosenbach, who was graduated from the Cincinnati College of Embalming and Undertaking and was among the first in the United States and the very first in Rochester licensed woman Funeral Director and Embalmer, he conducted the business until his death in 1926, whereafter Mrs. Rosenbach continued to run the business until her death last July. Associated with Mr. and Mrs. Rosenbach in 1913 until he died in 1931 was Mrs. Rosenbach's father, Louis B. Kohler.

Of interest then is the fact that both Mr. Boyce's grandfathers and both her mother and father have done funeral directing in Rochester for over a half of century. Now Mrs. Boyce, who received her funeral directing license in May, following in the footsteps of her father and mother, will conduct the business with her husband, Lewis J. Boyce, at the original place established by her father at 131 Allen Street, which was the beginning of the epoch of funeral homes. Prior to this undertaking establishments were no more than a front office and a couple of back rooms. The chapel and privacy of a room for the family so necessary to the modern funeral home of today offers the same restful atmosphere and tranquil and proper surroundings as it did when first planned by Mr. Rosenbach.

Under the name of the Frank W. Rosenbach Funeral Service, Mr. and Mrs. Boyce will serve Rochester people with the same reliable help, thoughtfulness and courtesy that has always been associated with the name; and, will themselves render a personal twenty-four hour service.
