Third son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank N. Hanna, 69 Wellington Ave., Rochester, to enter the armed forces, is Edward L. Hanna, chief parole and probation officer for the U. S. District Court of Western New York, who is reporting for active duty with the Coast Guard at Cleveland, Ohio.

Hanna has received his commission as Lieutenant, junior grade in the U. S. Coast Guard Reserve. He has been granted a leave of absence by Federal Judges Harold P. Burke and John Knight.

A brother, Capt. Austin B. Hanna, is assigned as chaplain at the War College, Washington, and another brother, Corp. Adrian M. Hanna is stationed at Pine Camp.

Lieutenant Hanna is a member of St. Augustine's parish and of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, and Rochester Fourth Degree Assembly.

He was Deputy U. S. Marshal from 1927 to 1931 and in January 1931, was appointed probation and parole officer and organized the system in Buffalo which covers 17 counties in Western New York.

In the tour of duty he has been a frequent visitor to Elmira where he visited with another brother, the Rev. Bernard D. Hannu, pastor of St. Anthony's Church.

Public Schools Open Each Monday For War Stamp Sale and Banking

Every Monday morning between 10:00 and 11:30 A. M., during vacation time, the public schools of Rochester open their doors to take in the War Savings of the boys and girls. This program for student War Savings is made possible by the Board of Education in cooperation with the Parent-Teachers' Associations and the Rochester Savings Bank.

Realizing that the Axis takes no vacation, 5,584 boys and girls have signed pledges to purchase War Stamps regularly throughout the summer.

In order to make possible the purchase of War Stamps without interruption, 74 members of the Parent-Teachers' Associations are giving their time each Monday

morning between 10:00 and 11:30 to act as banking representatives at the various schools.

Nine Public High Schools and 32 Grammar Schools are open for War Stamps and banking throughout the summer. Pupils whose schools are not open may take their War Savings to the school most convenient to them.

Since September 8, 1941, the boys and girls of Rochester have purchased over \$73,594.55 in War Stamps, while total savings including War Stamps and school savings amount to \$107,811.61.

Knowing that every effort to help is a step in the direction of victory the students of Rochester are bringing their savings to school every Monday morning.
