English Bishop Calls For Rejection Of New Education Proposals

LONDON. — More soundings of a threatening storm over education here are heard in a message of the Most Rev. Henry J. Poskitt, Bishop of Leeds, in which he calls upon Catholics in his Diocese who are members of local education committees to reject certain proposals which are to be placed before them soon.

The proposals, embodied in a report drawn up by a subcommittee of the Association of Education Committees, seeking a settlement of the education question and were designed for embodiment in a new Education Act.

Bishop Poskitt called on Catholics concerned to move the rejection of the report in its entirety and to move rejection of each objectionable section individually. The entire report, Bishop Poskitt charged, seems to be merely a camouflage to gain acceptance of similar objectionable proposals recently made by the Board of Education.

Specific objections cited by His Excellency were that the proposed coding of some non-provided schools would constitute the breaking of a solemn trust; that proposals for liquidation of denominational schools are founded on an ideology of totalitarianism and ignore the right of parents to have their children educated in the atmosphere of their faith, and that teachers so-called rights are especially safeguarded while the right of children to receive an education with their faith as a foundation are dismissed as of no importance.

The "non-provided" schools to which Bishop Poskitt referred include all Catholic elementary schools. The term means that the school buildings are not provided by the State. Under existing regulations they are built by Catholics themselves, with Government assistance in recent years, and they are maintained by the Government out of funds contributed by all taxpayers and ratepayers alike.
