Article Cites Record Of 600 Maryknollers

NEW YORK - The notable record of more than 600 American priests, Brothers and Sisters under fire in war-scouraged, China has been brought together in an article which appears in the current issue of The Field Afar.

"Our American missioners. states the article, written by the Very Rev. John J. Considine, M.M., "have withstood a thousand air raids, have seen their cities be-sieged, they have gone to the wounded and dying. The ceaseless tide, of refugees has poured in at their doors. Together with the Catholic missioners of 18 other nationalities in China, they have kept faith with their people.

"North, Central, and South China have almost equal contingents of American priests, Brothers and Sisters, with a slightly proponderant number in Central China. The figures, so far as we can determine, are: 220 Catholic American mis-sioners in North China, 277 in Cen-tral China, and 187 South China . There were almost 50 in Peiping, and 124 in Shantung, Prov-
