Japan Regime Repatriates Fr. White, Maryknoller

GENEVA - Friends and relatives were gladdened this week at the news that the name of Rev. E. Felix White was contained in the list of 625 Americans scheduled to return from the Pacific under exchange arrangements made through Swiss authorities.

Father White has been stationed in Chuwa, Korea, and is a member of the Maryknoll Mission group. He is the son of Mrs. Joseph W. White of 477 South Main St.

The young missionary has been in Korea for several years and for months after the outbreak of war between Japan and the United States no word was heard from him. Considerable anxiety was felt for his safety until April 26, when his mother received word from the Maryknoll Mission headquarters in Oquining, N. Y., that he was safe, and although he was interned, he was residing on mission property.

News of the safety of the missionaries from Maryknoll at that time was secured by the Holy See, whose delegate in Tokyo, Archbishop Marolla, made direct inquiry of the Japanese government.

The name of Richard White appeared in the list published on June 25, and included 60 Americans from Manchuria; 73 from Korea; 104 from Japan; 116 from Hongkong; 15 from Indo-China and 73 from Thailand. His name was listed under the exchange from Korea and was among a number of other names of missionaries and Sisters from the Maryknoll mission stationed in Korea.

Father White was ordained on June 16, 1937, in Maryknoll and celebrated his first high mass at St. Stephen's Church in this city on June 26.

After a visit in Geneva, he returned again to Maryknoll and left with other missionaries for his assigned post in Korea. When last heard of he was at Chuwa.

Early in May, following news of Father White's safety, the St. Stephen's Club of which he is an honorary member, arranged a large benefit card party for him at the Seneca Lake Country Club. The money was sent to the mission headquarters at Maryknoll.

Latest word from the Maryknoll headquarters is to the effect that the Maryknoll priests and Sisters repatriated from Japan may be given assignments to mission fields in South America.

Their departure was announced this morning by Charles Kleinhaus, Commander of the local Winnetka Post which is sending two Geneva representatives.

Young Donahue has just completed his Junior year at De Sales High School where he was active in school activities. The boys were accompanied to Madison by Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, principal of De Sales High School.

Several hundred boys from all counties of the State assemble each summer for the Boys' State sessions which are addressed by leading state and municipal authorities. The temporary community is operated to resemble the regular state government with the boys residing in various "towns" which sends representatives to the legislative bodies.

"What is the function of an educator?" Bishop Kearney said, "Our answer to that question is the education of the soul. Unless that is accomplished your education is incomplete."

Properly Motivated "There is an old saying 'knowledge is power,' but only when knowledge is motivated properly is it power," the Bishop continued, pointing out that the totalitarian powers have a knowledge which gives them a certain terrible power, but it is not the right kind of power.

After congratulating the members of the class on their fine record and urging them to remain loyal to the principles of their faith, Bishop Kearney concluded by saying:

"The chapters remaining in the story of your life must be written by yourself. May those chapters you write make as attractive reading in the sight of God and the angels as the chapter which you are closing this morning."

A profusion of red roses and peonies decorated the altars of the church for the Commencement program, which was opened with the processional of the graduates, members of the clergy and an honor guard of the Geneva Council of the Knights of Columbus in sword and baidric.

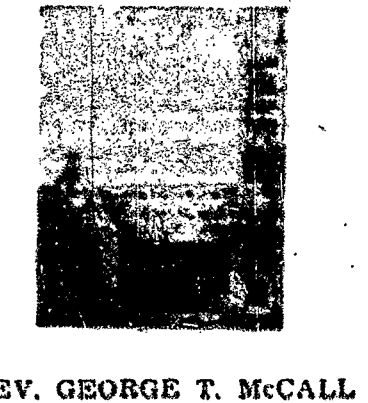

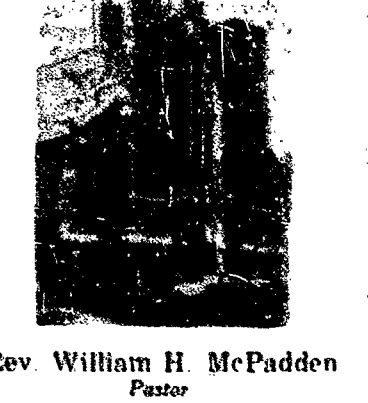
